## CINCO DE MAYO

Annual Cinco de Mayo celebrations are being planned within the Chicano communities. The University of Washington will open it with a week's worth of activities. May 1, there will be a Chicano film festival from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Ethnic Cultural theater. May 2, there will be a speaker at the Waterfront Activities Center at 7:30 p.m. May 3, there will be a Chicano variety show from 6 to 11 p.m; Raul Salinas will read, Teatro Estudiantil Revolucionario de Washington State University, Bailadores de Bronce, Teatro del Piojo and Baile folklorico Chileno. May 4, at Highline Community College, there will be a speaker and poetry reading beginning at 11 a.m. and a fiesta at noon till 2 p.m. with a pinata for the children and Mexican food, all for 25¢. That evening, there will be a dance in the UW HUB room 200ABC from 8 to midnight. May 5, there will be a Chicano basketball tournament all day in the Hec Edmundsun Pavilion, from 10 - 2 p.m., there will be activities for International Year of the Child in the Ethnic Cultural Center. May 6, there will be Mass in Spanish at 1:30 in the Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church, late lunch at Centro de la Raza from 1 - 6 p.m. and ending with "Little Joe y la Familia: at the Olympis Hotel Ballroom from 8 to midnight. Tickets are \$8.00 at the door.

#### MECHA CELEBRATION

MECHA of TESC began their celebration, April 26th and 27th with a Chicano Symposium and film festival. Noted Chicano historians, Rudolfo Acuna and Francisco Hernandez were the key facilitators. There were also Latino dancers and a performance by Teatro del Piojo.

### MAY DAY

There will be a special May Day event with Marxist Murry Weiss. He will be speaking on "IRAN: THE REVOLUTION UNVEILED". The lecture will be at 12:30 in Lecture Hall 3. Donations will be asked for at the door.

### JUSTICE FOR WHOM?

This past month brought two important legal battles to focus. The case of Hector Marroquin, Mexican activist (details Feb 79 newsletter) who's request for political asylum has been denied. INS (Imigration and Naturalization Service) Judge James Smith declared: "the fact that an alien would not enjoy in his own country the same type, degree and extent of political freedom and the freedom of the press that he would enjoy here does not entitle him" to political asylum. He has been given 30 days to voluntarily leave this country or be deported. An appeal will be filed; th defense committee is still in need to cover the appeal costs. The second case incolves WENDY YOSHIMURA, arrested with Patricia Hearst on weapons charges and conspiracy. The California Court of Appeal has upheld the 1977 conviction, and she now faces one to fifteen years for conspiracy and up to five years each for two counts of weapons possession. Evidence of racial discrimination granted the appeal but not the irradication of the charges. NOTE: Yoshimura's former roommate, Patricia Hearst has received a pardon and enjoying the life of a newlywed that's had a high soceity wedding.

# CHIQUITA BANANAS BOYCOTTED

UFW in Salinas, California urged the boycott on Chiquita Bananas. Why bananas and not lettuce? The boycott of bananas is attempting to cripple the profits of the parent company to have UFW demands of adequate wages and working conditions met. The subsidiary of lettuce growers (Sun Harvest)

belongs to the parent company of United Brands; Chiquita bananas being one of the best known of their products. Your support is needed in this effort.

### LOOKING FOR MONEY?

The Washington Commission for the Humanities has recently announced the receiving of \$524,000 in federal grant monies. The Commission has earmarked at least \$420,000 to be allocated as outright funds. All grant monies will be for support of public humanities programs. The next deadline is September 21, 1979. Minigrants of up to \$1,000 are also available. There are no deadlines for them. There is a WCH office on campus. Call for further information regarding guidelines.
