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Organic Farm expanding to include new building

A new Sustainable Agriculture Lab (SAL) is being proposed for the Organic Farm, which is currently a 5-acre cleared piece of land on the Evergreen campus. This expansion would be built on land that is currently forested and would therefore require the loss of many trees. The majority of public remarks from students have been against cutting down more trees to expand the farm.

Buildings currently on the Organic Farm includes the Farm House, Farm workroom, a bio-

diesel and supply garage, a composting facility, four greenhouses, a tool shed, a Farm barn, and a tractor barn. The rest of the farmland is made up of Demeter's Garden, community gardens, parking areas, the orchard, chicken yards, vegetable and flower production, research fields and bee houses.

Though the Organic Farm currently is used as a learning laboratory, many more people are interested in agricultural classes than the Farm can currently encompass.

The new SAL building "will also make it possible for the current programs at the farm... to apply more lab studies to their curriculum and thus provide a deeper understanding of science behind the topics. The building will also stand a proud example of the hard work and collaboration of students, faculty and staff," explains Halli Winstead, the Organic Farm manager's office assistant, who has been involved with the farm for three years. Winstead says the new building will be used for biology purposes, such as soil science and food science. In addition, it will also provide a space for student lab work and lectures. Though the exact size of the building has not been decided, an estimate is 3000 square feet, according to Paul Smith, director of facilities.

There has been a lot of negative feedback, mostly voiced over TESCtalk. The main con-

cern students have voiced, is how the folks advocating for this expansion justify cutting down trees, which is generally understood as an unsustainable act.



"The "organic" farm is cutting down the TESC forest bit by bit... Every year they have a new excuse to take away more of the forest," one student, vedsha13, wrote angrily over the campus-wide forum. "Sustainability is the usual excuse for unsustainable

The 29 arrestees of the anti-police brutality protest on April 8 held a barbeque downtown to present a positive image to the community. The barbeque occured during Arts Walk, on Friday April 23, in front of the Free Wall behind Last Word Books. The group of arrestees, who call themselves the State Street

29, and Friends of the State Street 29, cooked hotdogs and provided a table full of food, open to everyone in the community. Due to the negetive representation of those arrested in various news sources around Olympia, the group wanted to show the community a different view-point. Ringo, an Evergreen student, made a short speech to those who attended the event, which included Evergreen students, non-student community members and many street people. Overall, about 40 people passed through the barbeque over the course of the afternoon. The event went as planned, except a short visit by a Health Inspector. However, many people in the group had food handlers permits, and so could not be shut down for health violations. After the barbeque, several members of the State Street 29 handed out informational flyers about the unexpected results of the April 8 protest to the crowds who were out for artswalk.

According to Peter Kardas, the Labor Center's director, there are several unions and training programs on the South Seattle Community College's campus, as well as many unions in the geographical area.

Swift Geoducks closing in on championship seasor

Geoduck track and field moved one step closer to the Cascade Conference Championships this past weekend as they competed at the Western Washington University Twilight Meet in Bellingham, WA. Inclement weather could not keep the Geoducks from breaking more records and adding names to the list of athletes traveling to Gresham, Ore. May 13-15 for the CCC championships.

Brian Rakestraw dropped down to the 5,000 meter run this week hoping to work on his speed in order to stay sharp going into the championship season. Rakestraw placed third out of 28 competitors in 15:12.80. Rakestraw's time ranks him third in the conference and brought him within one second of the national qualifying time of 15:12.00. Had Rakestraw run eight tenths of a second faster, he would have qualified for the national meet in his third event. The fleet footed senior is already qualified for nationals in the marathon, and the 10,000 meter run. Rakestraw's time in the half marathon is still number one in the nation among NAIA competitors.

Freshman Emma Loftis added her name to the list of Geoduck athletes to be represent Evergreen at the CCC championships in the 400 meter dash. Loftis, who has not qualified in her primary event, the 800 meter, ran a 62.61 in the 400 meter to punch her ticket to Gresham.

Two-sport athlete Jasmine Horton made her debut on the Geoduck track team competing in the high jump and triple jump. Horton, who also plays on the Evergreen basketball team, cleared 4-10.25 in the high jump while she bounded to 31-8.75. Both performances qualified Horton for the CCC championships with her high jump performance being good enough to set a new school record.

In 1729, Jonathon Swift published "A Modest Proposal: For Preventing the Children of Poor People in Ireland from Being a Burden to Their Parents or Country, and for Making Them Beneficial to the Publick," the 'solution' was abhorrent (that was the point) but over 300 years later some people still don't get the joke. Andy Bichlbaum is a co-founder of the' Yes Men', the performance art and political activist group dedicated, in Bichlbaum's words: "To making a funny spectacle to get the press interested". Monday night at the Capitol Theatre Bichlebaum spoke for nearly two hours about his adventures in culture jamming and media pranking. The Yes Men impersonate powerful corporate executives and make outrageous claims to bring media attention to existing outrageousness. Bichlebaum recounts speaking before an interested crowd at a business conferences suggesting that poor people could be recycled as a cheap energy source. It wasn't until they started passing out candles shaped like people that anyone became suspicious. bichlebaum remembers," Horrified, they shuffled us off the stage to this holding pen

in the rodeo grounds in Calgary, threatening us with police action. All this time they're holding us we tell them 'No, we are from Exxon! You are going to be in trouble! We actually really wanted to get in trouble. A lawyer really wanted it go to court because he thought it would be a really funny case, but the court dismissed it." Bichlebaum reminisced about another prank wherein the Yes Men printed and distributed 85,000 fake copies of 'The New York Times", that was set months into the future (Telling the printer it was for an art installation, which was not entirely untrue). The paper had nothing but good news about the economy, the environment, and above the fold; a headline declaring the Iraq War over. Explaining the difference between the sort of hoaxing that the Yes Men perform for fun with their own money and the propaganda and greenwash provided by the corporate culture, Bichlebaum says "If you are Halliburton or Exxon you're automatically believed by a certain crowd. They never reveal that they are faking it-what we say is usually revealed to be fake after a few minutes".

If the ant was an animator, he would have a lot in common with Tommy Thompson, who spends at least 12 hours a day on campus, meticulously working on an animated short. Influenced by the stop motion animation of Tim Burton's "Nightmare Before Christmas" and "The Corpse Bride," as well as Ray Park's "Wallace and Grommet" stories, Tommy began his project "High Strung" over a year ago.


"I did smaller projects before this one. I thought I would have this one it done in two quarters. Then, I thought I would finish it over the summer. Then fall/winter. Here I am still working on it," says Tommy. Like the Guns and Roses album "Chinese Democracy" that Axl Rose spent over ten years on, Tommy wants to make sure his project comes out right. "It takes up all my time. It's all that I do."

Tommy has given himself a deadline to complete the animation for the Eye Candy Animation Festival (which he is also organizing) on June 5th. "I've been asking myself, 'why am I doing what I'm doing?' What why am I not going to parties? Why I am I spending all my time in a dark room with a doll in a dollhouse? "Despite Tommy's self-imposed pressure, his work makes the answer to that question self-evident. He spends the time because in the end, it will be worth it. "The piece is about the piece...the piece is about creating this piece. If you look right now there's a box inside the house, this studio is the room the house is the box... if you look on the table there's tiny diagrams. If you look on my wall, there's the same thing. I work hard and people seem to like it. I'm definitely lucky to be appreciated by the staff and faculty here. I got an enormous amount of support."


Tommy keeps pictures on the walls that friends have drawn for him to keep him motivated during the long hours (Tommy averages about 2-4 seconds of animation a day). I notice a drawing of a shiny apple on the bulletin board. "Raul Berman, one of my instructors, said, 'if you finish this piece, you should reward yourself. You should buy an apple.' I thought he meant the computer, but I wasn't sure. "Tommy explains. "Raul said, "If you finish this project I will buy you an apple. So the other day I said 'Hey, remember when you said you would buy me an Apple? And he was like 'I said I would buy you a computer?' And I said no, just an edible apple. I want that apple! I don't even like apples that much, but the apple is like the prize..."

The Eye Candy Animation Festival featuring "High Strung" will be at the Paramount Theatre home of the Olympia Film Society. The animation screening will coincide with the Olympia Comics Festival on June 5.



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Student Group Challenges "Crazy" Stereotype

"The Icarus Project envisions a new culture and language that resonates with our actual experiences of 'mental illness' rather than trying to fit our lives into a conventional framework." This is part of the mission statement of The Icarus Project, which has a local chapter at The Evergreen State College. We hold weekly support and activism meetings, and we are committed to breaking through the isolation that so many people with mental health conditions feel. One way we do this is by dispelling myths about people with mental health conditions. Way too often the media portrays people with mental health conditions inaccurately, and that can cause people with mental health conditions to feel that no one understands the reality of what they go through every day, and if they reveal their issues to someone, they might be misunderstood. An extreme, but relevant, example is the new horror movie, "The Crazies." The promotional materials for this movie (such as the previews and trailers, the movie's website, and online summaries of the movie) portray "crazy" people

as violent and unpredictable, which confirms a fear of mental health conditions that already exists. Even if the movie itself has a different message, the previews are still harmful in this way. These previews entered homes and minds through televisions and computers. These homes and minds belonged both to people who have mental health conditions, and people who do not. This misinformation and fear of people who are different harms us all. If a person reveals that they have a mental health condition or diagnosis, they risk being judged based on stereotypes about what a "crazy" person is. This is why the Icarus Project needs to exist, because these are difficult issues to talk about, especially when you don't want to "out" yourself as someone who isn't "normal."




