Racist graffiti found in Library by BRAIN FULLERTON

Racist graffiti was found on the walls of the men's bathroom between the market and admissions on the first floor of the library building. The bathroom is expected to be reopened sometime Friday.

The tagging included various antisemetic and racist slogans some of which are, according to Chief of Police Services Ed Sorger (and wikipedia) associated with a white supremecist gang in California. However, he thinks that this, with the other instances of white supremecist tags that have been showing up in the past have all been done by one person because of the similar drawings and handwriting. Depending on the final estimate of labor and material costs to repair the damages, the person could be charged with a Class C felony. Paul Smith, the Director of Facility Services, guesses that the

cost of the damages to the library bathrooms could be around \$600, which would come out of the Facility Services operating budget. Smith said that since there is nothing in his operating budget to cover the cost of cleaning graffiti, janitors end up working on that instead of the normal duties of their job.

The Bias Incident Response Team, whose task is to deal with incidents of hate crimes or bias that signifigantly affect the community, will meet on Wednesday May 26 to determine what the campus' response to this will be. As of the writing of this article, the team has not sent out an offical response to this indicdent.

Sorger, who is on this team, expects that the response to the incident will "discourage it."

World-renowned, political activist Angela Davis came to speak at Evergreen on May 22 to a large and energized crowd, which filled the CRC. Over 300 people showed up to watch her speech and the lecture by Antwi Akom, an educator, scholar and writer. The event

was sponsored by the Black Student Union and the Students of Color Coalition.

Akom, who spoke first, is a leading scholar on the environmental movement, specifically where race and environmentalism overlap. His work has mostly been about what he coined an "eco-apartheid," where cultural norms create and maintain racialized environmental health. Why are there only organic

grocery stores in middle and upper class white neighborhoods? Akom asks. Why are the parks in white neighborhoods?

"This is not just a climate change movement, this is a climate justice movement," he says. "Why do people in wealthy neighborhoods live 10.9 years longer than people in poor neighborhoods?"

Akom has done extensive research and political work surrounding the problem of ecoapartheid. He also does a lot of work in schools, and with other organizations, mostly in the Bay area. One organization that Akom has partnered with is called, "Kids versus Global Warming," which was founded by a 15 year old boy. Akom was thoroughly impressed with the work the group was doing, and decided to partner with them. This focus on school-aged children is important to Akom. He stressed the importance of educational equity, which is an immediate

"People need to change their critical consciousness," he says, driving home his point that the "green movement" must be deeply intertwined with the racial equality movement, and the social justice movement.

Angela Davis began her speech



by taking a moment to acknowledge the indigenous people who used this land before white settlers came, explaining how important it is that we never lose sight of indigenous struggles and showing right from the beginning how focused on equality and human rights she really is. Another testimony to her commitment to human rights was the fact that she spoke encouragingly with two Evergreen students before her speech about the current Evergreen divestment initiatives.



"We talked to her about divestment and gave her a keffiyeh [a traditional headdress worn in many Arab countries which has become a national symbol for Palestine]. She said she knew a lot about the issue, and that she had just given a talk about it recently. She said she would be happy to mention it during her speech," said Nathan Schuur, an Evergreen student who spoke to Davis on behalf of the Divestment campaign. Students in the audience were happy to hear Davis mention divestment, and how important it

was for as many students as possible to vote "yes" on this important human rights issue.

Davis focused the majority of the rest of her speech on the Prison Industrial Complex [PIC], and the need for abolition of the current system. Davis has been politically

active on that issue for decades.

A resident of California, Davis was disgusted by Arnold Schwarzenegger's decision to close parks instead of prisons, to deal with budget concerns. Also concerned with the environmental

"prison abolition is the only way She spoke favorably about Evergreen's own prison reform project, the Sustainable Prisons Project, directed by Evergreen professor Nalini Nadkarni. "I've looked at the work that's being done, and it's really incredible," she said of the efforts.

However, she also stressed that reform, while helpful, was not enough. David identifies as a prison abolitionist, stressing the need to have a completely different justice system, not simply a renovation of the current system.

"What do you think of when you hear the word 'abolitionist?" She asked the audience. "Slavery, right? So we think abolitionism is a done deal."

Well, it's not a done deal, and Davis is continuing the fight. In a brief critique of capitalism, Davis says that our society is redefining what it means to be free. We've moved beyond personal freedom to "commercial freedom." "Freedom is not a thing. It is not a commodity, but instead, an ongoing struggle to refasten community." She said in closing. "How can warehousing people in cages accomplish anything productive?" Good question. To learn more about Davis and her anti-PIC work, look towards the ongoing work of Critical Resistance, an organization Davis founded in 1998.

Amphetamine-laced pot ciculating on campus

This week, Evergreen officials confirmed rumors about marijuana laced with amphetamines circulating on campus. An email sent out May 6 by Dean of Student Services Phyllis Lane stated that a sample of the marijuana in question had been tested and, in fact, been "found to contain amphetamines."

The marijuana in question had been purchased on the Evergreen campus by a group of students who were unaware of its chemical properties. While smoking the tainted drugs, one member of the group began coughing uncontrollably. Before long, the coughing turned to retching and violent dry heaves. The victim then became unconscious and his companions called for an ambulance. The victim was rushed to Capital Medical Center, by which point his condition had improved and he had regained consciousness. It is not yet clear if the person who was precisely what manner of amphetamines were present in the tainted sample; however, reports of marijuana being laced with amphetamines, specifically crystal meth, have been corroborated by both doctors and law enforcement officials in British Columbia since at least 2006. Since a majority of the marijuana grown in British Columbia is exported to the Pacific Northwest, it is conceivable that marijuana laced with crystal meth could find its way to Olympia. "For a lot of people, it could take them by surprise," says Dr. Bill MacEwan, a researcher at the University of British Columbia. "It increases your heart rate, it makes you very agitated, you go sleepless and have anxiety."

The reaction to the news from the student body has ranged from horror and outrage to mild skepticism. "If we can't trust the weed, who can we trust?" wonderd Bobby Williams. Other students were skeptical that dealers would be able to sell laced marijuana without their clientele catching on.

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Geoduck track concludes historic season

The weekend of May 13-15 was a promising one for Evergreen track and field. By the conclusion of the 2010 Cascade Collegiate Conference championships in Gresham, Ore., the Geoducks tallied 17 points, just two points shy of their highest point total ever. Not only was the 17 points the second highest point total ever by an Evergreen team, but it was done by a young team that returns 14 out of 17 athletes to next year's group.

Brian Rakestraw was the only Geoduck sched-

uled to run on the first day of competition. Ranked fourth going into the men's 10k, Rakestraw looked to play the role of spoiler. The race saw several lead changes and 10,000 meters later, Rakestraw had finished in fifth place, running just over a second slower than his school record of 38:38.12. The Evergreen senior from Woodinville picked up four team points for the Geoducks, giving them momentum going into the weekend. Rakestraw had only planned on running the 10k at the CCC championships but decided to jump in the 5,000 meter run in efforts to pick up a team point or

two. In a very tactical race, Rakestraw showed heart and grit competing with the best in the conference just two days after running the 10k. He was unable to score any points but earned respect from his teammates and coach Jason McConnell, who said, "Brian has more heart than most runners on the track, and he showed it here. There isn't anything more we could've asked of him in that race."

Perhaps the biggest question mark of Evergreen's seven athletes going into the championships was junior quarter-miler Darren Woods. Woods strained his hamstring just two weeks prior to the CCC championships. Woods trained in the pool and on the stationary bike in the CRC to keep his fitness up in hopes of making a return to the track. Ranked fourth by DARREN WOODS

Woods agreed that he would try and run conservatively and get at least one team point. In the fastest heat of the 400 meters, Woods triumphed and finished in second place behind Corban College's David Henderson. The finish was the highest in Evergreen history for an athlete at the CCC championships. Woods ran his fastest time of the season, a 49.38 which improved his school record of 50.00 by .62 seconds and just under a half second off of the NAIA provisional qualifying mark of 48.90. His second place finish

Invitational. Abdelnoor has improved his time in the 400m hurdles from 61.24 down to 58.73 and his 110m hurdle from 17.44 to 16.38.

There were a pair of two-sport stars representing Evergreen at the championships. Emma Loftis, a freshman who also plays soccer for the Geoducks, competed in the 400m dash. Loftis, who leads the Evergreen women's team in the 200, 400 and 800 meter events, finished the 400 at conference in 1:00.90 seconds, just .29 slower than her season's best. The gritty freshman fin-

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was good enough for 8 team points. Any question mark that had hovered over Darren Woods at the beginning of CCC's was replaced by an exclamation point at the end of the 400m dash. Freshman school record holder Connor Abdelnoor scored in both the 110 meter high hurdles and 400 meter hurdles. Abdelnoor saved his best performance for last in the 110m hurdles lowering his school record of 16.43 to 16.38 in an eighth place finish that earned him one team point at the end of his first day of competition. More impressive than his gritty 110m hurdle performance was his fifth place finish in the 400m hurdles that earned him four more team points to make his final total five. The fleet frosh ran one thousandth of a second slower than his school record and personal best set just

set a personal record in the 200 meter race in 24.20 and posted a 12.21 in the 100 meter dash. Freshman Sebastian Lasbo ran his best race of the season in the biggest race of the season, posting a 2:06.14 in the 800m dash.

Geoduck track and field has a lot to look forward to for the 2011 season as they return 14 out of 17 athletes from this historic team that has broken 12 school records and finished two points shy of its highest point total in history at the CCC championships. Look for Brian Rakestraw at the NAIA national championships this weekend in Marion, Indiana. Rakestraw will be competing in his last race as a Geoduck where he is ranked number one in the country in the half marathon.

The Board of Trustees meeting on May 12 provided an opportunity for students to speak their minds about the current situtation of summer tution hikes. As I listened to student speakers who addressed their concerns and opinions, it came to me that this public forum lacked something that should have happened before: a student and faculty Q/A panel. Perhaps if an effective panel was held, more of the students in that Wednesday's meeting would have understood how Evergreen's budget works, such as how the legislature currently influences our budget.

With that in mind comes a question: From what students said at that meeting, what do they know about this issue?

The first obvious thing most students who attended seemed aware of was that tuition to lash out at the College for adding to your increases have risen consistently over the past troubles, occupying the structures erected for couple of years, but what economic factors were actually effecting that was not their topic of discussion. Some students had clearly done research about the role of the board of trustees in the current budget, and had some idea that it involved plenty of legislative influence. It was when students started using the trustees board as a verbal punching bag for their frustrations about the dilemmas they and other students were facing that I lost faith that there were going to be any solutions. I could see a considerable amount of apathy amongst many Evergreeners in even looking to communicate with their community and their College. Instead, there was name calling and heckling, not to mention some references to Neoliberalism as justification for discontentment with the decisions of the Board of Trustees. This dragged the debate away from the issues that really needed to be discussed. Though I am not an advocate of censorship and I believe in people speaking their minds,

I found that the thickness of my skin was the

deciding factor when it came to how much of that hatred I could listen to.

I ask any faculty or student at Evergreen to consider my proposal for another open Q/A panel regarding the budget, even if there has been one in the past. It is evident from what happened at the board of trustees meeting that there are not enough students who know about the scenario presented, or how they can contribute. More facts and questions need to be clarified before more statements are made like what was said at that meeting, before becoming too dogmatic. Also a student and faculty lobby group for the interests of the college would be instrumental at the legislative level.

Yes there is going to be a tuition hike, my fellow students. However, there is a solution, though not in the short term as you may desire. The key to this issue is to avoid reserving judgment for

individuals or identifiable groups to your concerns. Although you may be inclined your benefit, and spitting in front of the law, just or unjust, will lead you only to apathy in the end. Instead you must show how the unjust acts have wronged you. In the end, your actions will hold more weight than your tongue and your fist will, as a mentor once taught me. It is up to you to decide whether your actions will be positive or negative. Inside Capoeira Angola

If you find yourself cutting through the lower level of the CRC on a Saturday afternoon, you may look into room 117 and see a group of people rhythmically altering the contours of their bodies, coiling into shapes and unbending again, performing subtle acrobatics. They interact with one another physically, but untouching, in an ebb and flow that matches a tribal soundtrack of drums, bass, and tambourine. This is Capoeira Angola.

I spoke about Capoeira with Benjamin Pixie, who has been a member of the student group for five years. "Capoeira Angola is a Brazilian dance-fight game. It has its roots in Africa...It's amazing, it's one of the most complete cultural art forms to experience. There's language, there's music, there's movement; our team talks about it like a "body conversation" that you have with your friends, where they ask a question and you give an answer." A physical 'dialogue' is spoken between participants, who are striving to have a beautiful and meaningful conversation with their bodies alone.

The dancers swirl around each other in circles, bending and turning in rhythm with the music, which is specific to Capoeira. An array of tribal-looking instruments lay on the ground, which are used to create music at the beginning of the meeting before the physical training begins. "There's an instrument we play called the berimbau," says Pixie. "It has it's roots, again, in Africa. It comes from a curved piece of wood, and it's used with an arame, the string, which would have been traditionally cut in Brazil but now we use the wire from a tire, and it produces a really great sound."

Capoeira Angola has it's roots in Africa, but it's mainly a Brazillian phenomenon. Pixie explains it's origins. "The would-be African slaves that were taken from Angol and Guinea and Mozambique and othe regions of Africa [were] brought over to Brazil, with an influence of Portuguese cul ture." The word Capoeira itself is a word on ative Amazonians, making the game an international blend of art and culture. "On of the things that attracted me to it is tha it's still a checkpoint in gaining new culture and really reaching across borders."

The Capoeira Angola student group meet Wednesday at 2pm and Saturday at 12:30pn in CRC 117.



Student artist designs, installs her "benchmark"

You may have noticed the great wooden face that guards over the tables where students have coffee or burritos in the current home of Aramark's Market. The 'face' is the sculpture "Scuinqua" which was commissioned by Evergreen in 2004 from the accomplished Canadian artist Susan Point. When construction necessitated the relocation of the Market to the first floor of the library building, there was concern about the increased amount of traffic around the sculpture. Since the Washington Arts Commission uses half of 1% of construction budgets of state-owned buildings for the acquisition of artwork, there was an opportunity for a student artist to create a new piece that complimented and 'protected' the Susan Point sculpture.

Evergreen senior Tally Locke ("graduating in a few short weeks") took on the task of designing and building benches to go around the sculpture as part of Green Studio, a sustainable design program. The benches were installed Monday and Tuesday of this week. "They took longer than one quarter to build, but I was determined to stick with it." Tally said. Before deciding to come to Evergreen and engage in 'more artistic pursuits" Tally apprenticed as a boat builder in Maryland. She says she knew she had to keep working with wood and 'just kind of fell into furniture making".

Public art can be an opportunity for professional artists but not without unique challenges: "a project of this scale is tricky business," Tally explains. "There are lots of people to please." She lists facilities, campus art committee, faculty members, the WA State Arts Commission, and the artist Susan Point herself as all being a part of the process. According to Tally, "It's been hard to satisfy all their needs while staying true to my design aesthetic and artistic sensibilities. But in the end, I think I was successful at both." The design that was agreed on are two graceful, semi-circular 'benches' that compliment the original aesthetic of Point's sculpture in addition to being functional.

Assisting Tally was sophomore Nicole Davenport. Tally says, "She has been a great help! I couldn't have done it without her!"

The benches are constructed out of FSC certified (Forest Stewardship Counsel) and are Western Red Cedar and Mahogany. The wood finish used on the piece has a lower than average volatile organic content and is plant-based, rather than synthetic. They are 9 1/2 feet long.

More of Tally Locke's sculpture/furniture will be on display as part of the Sprout Art Show, June 12-13th, Opening at 7pm on the 12th, Cherry Street Lofts.
