Discipline process for faculty extended

disciplinary process, the decision on whether faculty member Jorge Gilbert keeps his job has been postponed.

Jason Wettstein, who does public relations for Evergreen, says both Gilbert and the college have decided to extend the final decision. However, he could not specify why the process has been extended or how long.

Wettstein said on Thursday that he could not go into specifics because "the matter is still under review" and it's a "personnel matter." Don Bantz, vice president of the academic division, added in an interview on Friday that Gilbert and the college have both agreed to this extension.

Originally, a discharge hearing for Gilbert was set for October

Gilbert has been under a faculty discipline process based on charges from the school auditor's investigation into study abroad

After nine months of a school trips to Chile for his program over the past four years.

> According to auditor's report, Gilbert had "received over \$50,000 in the last 4 years from the College and its students that could not be tied to any expenditures or disbursements." The report also said Gilbert may have entered "contracts on behalf of the college" with family members, and handled student money in his personal account.

> There are six charges against Gilbert in the disciplinary process including conflict of interest and deception, according to Don Bantz.

> As a member of the faculty union, Gilbert is entitled to a hearing and a chance to respond to allegations.

Police chief responds to rifle decision

Ed Sorger, chief of Evergreen Police Services, was recently interviewed about the decision made last week not to purchase rifles for the Evergreen police.

"My purpose for being here and the officers' purpose for being here is to keep the campus safe for people to live, work, and learn. While an active shooter is a rare occurrence, it isn't something we could go thinking it couldn't happen."

The decision not to purchase the guns was made by Art Costantino, vice president for student affairs, after a year of forums and feedback about the proposal from the Evergreen community.

"I proposed it, so obviously I'm disappointed," said Sorger when asked how he felt about Costantino's decision. "The decision takes tools away from me. The response is more limited than if I'd had the right stuff."

The basis for the proposed purchase was that the pistols Evergreen police are currently equipped with are not as accurate

at long distance as rifles would be, making it harder for Police Services to respond effectively in the event of a shooting on campus.

Instead of equipping Police Services with rifles, Sorger will focus more on working with outside agencies to prepare for a shooter situation.

Geoduck Union update

Monday's meeting was facilitated by Josie Jarvis. At the beginning of the meeting, former Evergreen students Aaron Lee and Brian Fligner presented on Gateways for Incarcerated Youth and the Center for Community-Based Learning and Action.

Discussion then turned to official Geoduck Student Union business. A quorum was not present, so no official action could be taken. Jarvis presented the duties of the four-person coordinator panel, and representatives started nominating people.

Patrick Walsh presented a draft version of the petition form for filling empty seats on the GSU. The form would require names,

signatures, and A-numbers of 5% of the campus population in support of a candidate. Representatives agreed the final form would have to include the deadline, November 4, as well as what 5% of each campus population would be.

There was brief discussion of a union stewards program, but representatives determined that it would be more appropriate to shelve that project until winter quarter. Jarvis then brought up committee panels and requested a volunteer to group the committees in a logical way for the next meeting. The meeting finally turned to the arbitration process Trevor Van Dyke and Tessa Wyllie de

Echeverria have been working on. The process is intended as a way of keeping student appointees accountable to the GSU, and providing "a space ... that students can come with their complaints."

The meeting concluded with a "go-around" as representatives discussed how they felt about the process. The consensus was largely positive. Jarvis announced that this will likely be her last week as an official GSU representative, and the meeting ended on a supportive note.





Men's soccer loses heartbreaker: still in playoff contention

The Geoduck men's soccer team lost a heartbreaker Tuesday at home to bitter rival Concordia University of Portland, Ore. The game was tied at one thanks to a heads up score by Corey Johnson in the early stages of the game. Concordia's Facundo Dipascuale punched in an unassisted goal with less than ten minutes left in regula-

tion to seal the deal for the visiting Cavaliers. With massive playoff implications, the winners of this game put themselves in a good position to make the playoffs. The Cascade Collegiate Conference receives three bids to send its

top three teams in the conference to the National Tournament in Fresno, Calif., November 30-December 5.

Evergreen is currently sitting in fifth place in the CCC, behind Warner Pacific (8-1 CCC), Concordia (8-3), College of Idaho (5-2-1), and Oregon Tech (5-3-1). Sitting at 4-4-2 in conference, the Geoducks still have four games left on their schedule; three of those games are against teams in front of them in the standings. Evergreen takes a trip up Interstate 5 this Saturday in what they hope to be a win against confer-

ence foe Northwest University. A trip to Oregon Tech six days later marks the Geoducks' last road game of the season, while they will have the last two games of the 2009 season on their home turf against Warner Pacific (November 3) and College of Idaho (November 7). Of course, goals also play a large role in the standings should the Geoducks end up in a tie at the end of this four game stretch, so they may

Mirza Memic and Corey Johnson, who are in the top ten in goals scored in the CCC, will be expected to continue providing headaches for opposing defenses.

Chris Miller has been an assist machine for the Geoducks this season and should contribute greatly if Evergreen hopes to make an appearance in this year's tournament. With animalistic energy from Nathan Salveson in the net, Evergreen should be able to keep opposing teams from accumulating many more points.

Clean Energy Committee blows up...

The CEC was established by the Clean Energy Initiative which purchases renewable energy credits (RECs) and provides financial support for on-campus energy projects. With every \$1 of energy saved on campus, 10 cents is now used to purchase RECs and is available to support student projects and long term goals that address renewable energy, energy conservation, and energy education. We all know that clean energy is awesome, but why all the excitement?

Currently there is \$192,795 in the Clean Energy Fund. That is right! \$192,795 for projects that focus on renewable energy, energy conservation, and energy education here on campus. Where did all this money come from during these tight economic times? Well, in winter of 2005, 91% of voting Evergreen students thought it would be wise to support the emerging renewable energy credit market and connect on-campus energy savings to students through a self-imposed \$1 per credit hour fee. Initially the fund was only anticipated to generate roughly \$20,000 a year (or 10% of fees) for clean energy projects. In the past three years the price of renewable energy credits has dropped significantly, and the amount of energy used per student is also declining as the school becomes more energy efficient. This year the Clean Energy Fund will generate close to \$100,000 after the purchase of RECs.

Building upon the success of last year, 2009-10 will be a landmark year for clean energy on Evergreen's campus. Last year the Clean Energy Fund supported the purchase of a larger bus shelter, bike racks, safety equipment, a biomass gasifier, native plantings, and brought Hunter Lovins to speak for Synergy. Projects for this year include pre-design for a biomass gasification plant, possible bike share program, and support for the purchase of a hybrid police services vehicle. With the completion of the school's Climate Action Plan there is now a framework to reach carbon neutrality by 2020 and a clear vision of large-scale clean energy production on campus.

A refreshed and dedicated CEC is working hard to help you finance your clean energy dreams. Come join us at public meetings every other Friday from 1:00-3:00 in the Facilities conference room, a student development workshop through the Plato Lecture Series on December 1 from 4:00-5:30 p.m. in LH 1, and the Clean Energy Fair in the spring. The CEC, with the support of the student body, will also work on expanding the Clean Energy Initiative to create more funding opportunities for future students. 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SPRINKLE SPEAKS

"I'll be gentle with you, I promise," began guest lecturer Annie Sprinkle in Evergreen's Experimental Theater on the night of October 20. Though Sprinkle first made a name for herself by appearing in hundreds of adult films during the 1970s, she has gone on to be known as a performance artist, ecologist, sex educator, and director as well. The night's performance was a showcase of the highlights from this engaging woman's exciting life and multiple careers.

During the show, Sprinkle touched on her humble beginnings, which included everything from the liberal household she was raised in, to how she first encountered pornography, to becoming lovers with Gerard Damiano, director of the famous X-rated film Deep Throat. It was also Damiano who opened the door for her into the porn industry.

Plop!


Gaily splashing,

Starting behind the scenes, Sprinkle soon moved in front of the camera as a performer, then eventually began directing pornos herself. Because of her time in pornography, Sprinkle became deeply invested in advocating on behalf of the sex worker lifestyle and just as strongly for safe sex after AIDS hit the scene in the 80s. It was during this decade that Sprinkle began to develop her performance art style and created her "post porn modernist manifesto." Sprinkle showed footage from some of her past performances, including a sex magic masturbation ritual and showing

off her cervix to about 4,000 people while touring 14 different countries.

Sprinkle became interested in ecology when she and her partner married the earth in a ceremony that was part of a seven year-long performance piece. Now in year five, each year of this piece is devoted to a different chakra of the body, and every year Sprinkle and her partner marry something new in an elaborate, festive ceremony.

The audience was engaged throughout the performance and many stuck around afterwards to thank Sprinkle for her

work, browse through her DVDs and prints for sale, and give her hugs.

Sprinkle also hosted the Sidewalk Sex Clinic in the library on Nov. 21, which offered free sex advice and sex tarot readings.

Cheap date: library movie review

Kurosawa's "Hidden Fortress"

The Hidden Fortress

1958, dir. Akira Kurosawa. Japanese with subtitles.

If you haven't seen a Kurosawa film yet, this is a good place to start. Kurosawa has been acknowledged as one of the greatest and most influential directors ever, and *The Hidden Fortress* is probably his most accessible film. It has many action sequences and even the slow sections are so gorgeously shot that it's like watching a dream.

The story is an elaborate variation of the "briefcase-full-of-money" plot. A motley pack of travelers work together and against each other for a stash of gold in feudal Japan. Toshio Mifune is at the top of his game in this movie, playing his signature stoic samurai badass. Mifune's badass is one of the great movie badassesup there with Clint Eastwood as El Hombre Sin Nombre, Uma Thurman as The Bride, or Robert DeNiro or Samuel Jackson when they aren't doing comedy. The female lead, Misa Uehara (Princess Yuki) is equally

badass and captivates in her every scene.

The story is framed by a couple of completely amoral and cowardly soldiers whose clowning shtick is sometimes a little broad. They remain interesting because their characters are so morally bankrupt you have no idea what they are going to do.

Kurosawa was a pioneer of wide-angle shots and telephoto lenses. He shot in black and white long after it went out of style because of the depth of field that B&W photography affords. If talking about telephoto lenses and depth of field gives you a movie-boner like it does for me, a familiarity with Kurosawa is essential. The Evergreen library has the Criterion

Collection DVD of the movie and it looks awesome. And not just the casually hyperbolic "awesome" of the inarticulate, but "awesome" as in "that which inspires awe." And remember: watching movies with subtitles is a mark of sophistication. On the unsophisticated side of the spectrum, come back next week when I will talk about the inspired sleaze that is Switchblade Sisters.

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

On July 29 of this year, a judge in California granted my lawyer's request to reduce my vandalism conviction



from a felony to a misdemeanor. Although I had hoped the judge would expunge the conviction altogether, the outcome was essentially what I desired: the "felony" designation was removed from my criminal record. After seven years, I am no longer a felon.

When I was 18 years old, I broke some windows of a fast food restaurant that had food-poisoned me. It was a brash and foolish act, an act that prosecutors believed warranted a felony charge. In exchange for pleading guilty, I was placed on probation for five years, ordered to perform community service, pay restitution, and relinquish my Fourth Amendment rights for three years. But it was the stigma of a felony conviction that proved to be the harshest punishment because it had no expiration date; no matter how lawfully I behaved (even after successfully completing probation), future employers and landlords would always be privy to the knowledge that I was a felon. And because the word "felon" in our society is synonymous with "dangerous" and "violent," discrimination was something I grew accustomed to in certain situations.

This article was written to inform and empower people who, more often than not, are woefully misinformed and disempowered. Advocates for convicted criminals are hard to come by, but I feel that my insight and experience in this arena have pushed me into this strange role.

So this is for those of you who have made mistakes and, for some reason, are still paying for them. It's for the felons and those with misdemeanors too; for those of you who deeply regret what you may have done, and even for those of you who only regret getting caught. I

hope you find it useful. I should begin by flatly stating that some crimes are virtually impossible to expunge in the state of Washington. These include class A felonies, violent crimes and sex crimes. Even some misdemeanors (including DUIs) can be extremely difficult to expunge in this state.

But for those of you

who are eligible, the primary prerequisite to expungement is completing all the court-ordered requirements that were imposed on you at sentencing, including paying all fines and completing probation. Sometimes this can take years, but don't be discouraged: judges are more inclined to expunge if ample time has passed since the date of conviction.

Once you've completed all your courtmandated obligations, it's time to consult with an experienced attorney who will review your case and give you his expert opinion. Be patient when searching for the right lawyer. I recommend meeting with several of them before deciding on one. Do some research online as well; you may find some unsavory reviews from former clients.

Once you've retained your lawyer, there's not much more for you to do but wait. You probably won't have to appear in court, and it shouldn't be more than a few weeks before you get a judgment. While you're

> waiting, your lawyer will be making the case to a judge that what you did years ago was an aberration, something you will never do again. By avoiding any additional arrests (while on probation/parole, and afterward), you will only be making your lawyer's case stronger.

I want to talk about

felons and voting. It is a common misconception that all felons are prohibited from voting. The truth is, the right to vote is a state's decision and the law varies from state to state. In California, where I was convicted, felons can vote as long as they're not in prison or on parole. That means that, despite what I was led to believe, I was never disenfranchised. In Oregon, the law is even more lax: anybody who is not in prison, including parolees, can vote. Here in Washington, the law is a bit more complex: felons convicted after July 1, 1984 can vote, but they have to complete their parole or

probation terms and pay any outstanding fines and restitution first. These felons need a Certificate of Discharge to restore their right to vote. A copy of this certificate can be obtained at the County Clerk's Office in the county where you were convicted. Those convicted of a felony in Washington state before June 1, 1984 must petition the Indeterminate Sentencing Review Board to restore their right to vote. The ISRB can be reached at (360) 493-9266 or by visiting www.srb.wa.gov.

Entering the criminal-legal system as a defendant can be a frightening experience, especially for young people. Punishment can entail imprisonment, the loss of one's rights, discrimination with employment or housing, etc. The best advice I can give to somebody living with a conviction, or facing charges, is to educate themselves on their rights. I went years before I did this, and I lived for years in ignorance as a result. Don't make the same mistake I did; go online, make some phone calls, and educate yourself.
