
Mostly we sell tubes and patch kits and other dainty small items.






















Capoeira Angola is the more traditional form of Capoeira, closest to the way the African slaves practiced the art. 





## The realities of daily violence «

From Oct. 5 through Oct. 11, the Coalition Against Sexual Violence displayed thirteen statues from Washington State's Silent Witness Exhibit. These statues were red life-size plywood figures placed throughout the second floor of the library lobby. The Silent Witness Exhibit in its entirety honors thirty-one women killed by their partners, bearing witness to the outrageous number of women who experience domestic

One of the many goals of our student group is to create positive awareness about the realities of sexual violence. When working with these issues, one quickly notices the direct correlation sexual violence has with domestic violence, hate crimes or any other form of oppression. Perpetrators of sexual and domestic violence are working to overpower and control someone else's body and often their lives. Recognizing these connections will take us a step further in the prevention of all violence.

The Coalition Against Sexual Violence would also like to recognize that sexual and domestic violence touches the lives of many people besides heterosexual women. Shelters, crisis-lines and resources that benefit and work towards the safety of women have only developed over the last twenty years. Violence experienced by men in queer relationships and the transgender community often remains hidden. Statistics are hard to find and often inaccurate. The Coalition Against Sexual Violence would like to work more with these issues and invites anyone from the Evergreen community to bring information and energy on these subjects.

International Women's Week began almost one hundred years ago, when the U.S. Socialist Party appointed a Women's National Committee to campaign for women's suffrage and other rights. The committee proposed that one day a year be set aside for women's right to vote. This day became known as National Women's Day. The observance spread to Europe and on March 8, 1917, thousands of Russian women left their homes to protest Russian poverty and wat. This day became known as the "strike for bread and peace." It has been called the final thrust in the revolution that resulted in the abdication of Czar Nicholas II In hono, of this strike. March 8 became globally recognized as International Women's Day.

The celebrations lost steam during Warld War II but were revived in the 1960s without

Scrape down the sides a couple of times during blending, to make sure it's smooth. Transfer to a saucepan and heat gently over low heat until nice and hot stirring frequently. Arrange the cooked fettucini on a big plate, and pour the sauce over it. Sprinkle with the chopped basil, and serve!

So all was well through the opening bands at last Saturday's Punk Rock prom, but by the time the third band, Grieving The Days To Come, took the stage, the energy level in the mosh pit had escalated to slam dancing reserved for hardcore shows.

By the end of the night, several people were assaulted, fights broke out, tears were cried, and constant interruptions and a hostile environment disappointed those who came to the prom to dance. All this happened without the presence of the police or an ambulance.

Attendees were met with a hardcore show advertised as the Punk Rock Prom. "I was thinking some more melodic punk bands would play," commented Brian Orr, an Evergreen freshman. Those that didn't know all the bands were hardcore expected to be able to dance.

At a hardcore show, the type of behavior displayed would have been acceptable. "It

was pretty ridiculous booking a hardcore show," said the lead singer of Beneath the Ashes after the show. "We want people kickboxing in the pit. Usually no one gets hurt, but these kids don't understand that they're going to get hit if they go in the pit."

The first casualty was Chris Trout, a visitor from Yelm. "I was in the [mosh] pit and this guy just turned and hit me in the face," Trout said.

Immediately following Trout's incident, a fight broke out in the pit. The set ended and the lights came on.

Then, while the two main moshers in the pit were held at bay, a member of the audience that was allegedly punched took the stage declaring that "as a women [she felt] violated by this masculine bullshit."

After her comments, one of the coordinators for the event politely asked for the level of violence to be taken down.

#### Roundhouse kicks in a mosh pit? It happened Saturday at Evergreen.

At this point, some of the audience felt that the aggression level in the pit had risen to dangerous levels, while others defended their right to proceed with their preferred style of dance, which involved anything from random roundhouse kicks to rapid-fire punches, by a dozen or so people.

As the next band, Beneath the Ashes, came on, it was obvious that neither side was willing to yield to the other's preferences. Nonetheless, the slam dancing continued.

Then, during the set, three Greener males expressed their discontent with the aggression by taking off all their clothes. With the phrase "Fuck this macho bullshit" written in permanent marker across their backs, they proceeded in completely cleaning out the mosh pit. Consequently one was hit in the testicles, leading to his hasty exit.


No Evergreen event would be complete without a dialogue, and that's exactly what happened after several coordinators and staff members took the stage while Himsa was still playing, turning their backs to the crowd and blocking the band. One of the coordinators said that she was "not pleased with the way this has gone, because it has created an environment that makes people feel unsafe."


Some of the audience members left, but a good number remained in order to voice their opinions about this controversial subject.

While the dialogue revolved around the level of violence and the supposed "macho-ism" of those being violent, John Mastro, an Evergreen sophomore, felt that the conflict lay in another area. "I don't think this event was planned very well." Mastro said. "There should have been a greater variety of bands. It wasn't advertised what type of bands would be playing. No one here knew it was a hardcore concert or else they probably wouldn't have gone. Obviously hippies and hardcore kids aren't going to mix at a concert." Mastro also added, "I don't think the violence had anything to do with masculinity. There were girls in the pit that were hitting just as hard as the boys were."

Evergreen Queer Alliance. That's why they're putting one on this Saturday. All night. Four floors. And they hope to draw about 1,000 Wilkie's been on the party scene for a long time. She's never heard of rave-goers getting harassed about sexual orientation.

"There's just not a large population of people who feel violent at raves," Wilkie says.

But not everyone agrees.

Maeanna Welti runs Evergreen's Women's Resource Center. "I wouldn't Welti, and other Evergreen counselors, say little is known about sexual assault in gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender communities. Many even though it's supposed to be.

If it's not drug-free, then it's less likely to be safe. So says Jason Kilmer. He studies people's use of drugs and alcohol, and things they regret later after using drugs. He can cite studies that show a higher risk for sexual assault.

The rave planners are emphasizing music and dancing, and they've acknowledge that determined dopers and troublemakers will find a way to do dope or cause trouble.

Well, planners were still hashing out those details as the CPJ went to press. Members of Evergreen's women's rugby team — the Hellcarz — have signed on to do security. So have some male members of the EQA. The police will have three extra officers on duty that night. Two will patrol campus, and one will be inside the building. In all, about 30 people will be working security.

The EQA has also hired a dozen first-aid providers — students certified in CPR — to work in two-hour shifts. There will also be bottled water for sale in an effort to keep people from dehydrating.

There will be only one entrance to the rave, located in the Library building. Those who leave the building won't be let back in, and the rooms that won't be used for the rave will be locked down.

Can't people just take drugs before they go inside?

"Yeah, that's definitely a possibility," one EQA member said. "If somebody shows up obviously wasted, we're going to ask them to leave."

This is not the first time Evergreen has been the scene of a gigantic party. The EQA put on a "rainbow rave" two years ago. The student activities advisor who oversaw that rave said it went well. As for this Saturday's rave, she's staying "cautiously optimistic."

The EQA's recruitment rave will be this Saturday, Jan. 26, from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.






The whole shindig is costing about \$4,300. About \$1,000 of that will pay the DJs. All of that money comes from student fees — full-time students pay \$118 a quarter for student services and activities. ## How's Your Reception?

As you probably know, KAOS upgraded its transmitter and antenna last December, moving them to a much higher -- and therefore better -- location on Tumwater Hill. For many regular KAOS listeners, this meant greatly improved reception, particularly in the downtown Olympia area. It Mt. Rainier, from Centralia to Tacoma and beyond. also extended our signal reach in all directions; now, listeners can tune us in from Montesano to


bine at a single location, reception can become fuzzy and distorted. This is technically known as "multipath distortion." These effects are the likely cause of the degraded reception some listeners experienced after the upgrades; the signal is taking a different path to their listening location. However, FM radio waves have characteristics that can make reception tricky. For example, they tend to travel in straight lines and are often blocked by hills or large buildings. They can also be reflected by buildings, water towers, and large bodies of water. When multiple reflections com-







Also known as a two-day celebration, Los Dias de los Muertos, this holiday combines the Catholic traditions of All Saints' Day (November 1) and All Souls' Day (November 2) with ancient scioncepts of death that have been part has Mexican society since the reign of the Aztecs. Of the literally hundreds of ethnic and cultural groups in this region, our work focuses on Mandinka music.

We believe that part of what draws people to drumming is that this music requires that individuals share their personal creativity to heighten the creative power of the community. The music we create is a living and participatory event, freely created and freely shared.







The modern day Roman Catholic Church is a venerable and notoriously conservative organization. The Church's stance on issues such as birth control, abortion rights, and ordination of women for the priesthood is several decades out of line with the progressive humanist movement. In other ways, particularly economic policy, the Church is very liberal. The Pope has issued several statements concerning the rights of humans to be treated according to their innate dignity instead of as commodity exchanges. This stance puts the Church squarely at odds with modern American capitalism. The Church also originally stood strongly against charging interest for loans. This was during feudalism, but the Church saw no moral justification in making money on money. This perspective has been watered down in recent centuries, a however, and the Church is now virtually silent on the interest.

The size of the church makes disagreements within the ranks inevitable, and many of the disagreements within the Church today concern sexual politics. On the issue of birth control, the Roman Catholic Church says the prevention of conception is a sin. The Orthodox Catholic Church (a separate entity from the Roman Catholic Church – the Orthodox Church


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
the church and re-affirmed the importance of women in the Church – if not as priests, then performing such activities as reading scripture during mass. Under Pope John Paul II, however, there has been a backlash, and he has brought the Church back to its more traditional, conservative roots.

Branden Wilson is the coordinator of Evergreen's Radical Catholics for Justice and Peace and is representative of the current wave of liberal Catholics. He emphasizes that he does not speak for the whole of RCJP, and again and again mentions areas where he and the Roman Catholic Church agree, but he does hold some differing opinions. Wilson calls the Church's stance on homosexuality "archaic" and says, on the notion of Papal infallibility, "Personally, I think the idea is absurd." He does praise the Jesuits, the more liberal and intellectual wing of the church, for their participation in the Sandinista overthrow of the Nicaraguan government.

Wilson's basic point is that the Church's entrenched ruling faction is overly traditional and hierarchical. The problems of the Church are institutional in nature and allow the many diverse opinions that make up the Church. This would lead to greater grass-roots activism and and allow the many diverse opinions that make up the modern Roman Catholic Church to be heard.



Moore apologized for being late and thanked the crowd for their patience, n launched into two hours of inspiring, ned, and outright funny communication

A major theme of Moore's talk was that "the United States is a liberal, left wing, progressive country." The audience reacted with disbelief when he made that statement, so he said it again with strong conviction. He had ample evidence to support his statement. For example, 154 million people in the U.S. did not vote for Bush in the "coup" of 2000. Every city on his book tour (Olympia being the 45th) has been full of people just like those in the CRC. His book "Stupid White Men" has been number one on the New York Times bestseller list for a month without any mainstream publicity. "We are the majority now," Moore told the rapt listeners. "You are

not alone."

The United States, a conservative, right wing country? Big lie. The people in power support this image with their polls, with Bush's supposed 90-percent approval rating, with their massive

propaganda, a.k.a. mainstream media. They want to "enhance your cynicism and despair." Well, Moore said, Americans are tired of being told to shut up. They're tired of feeling the pressure to be patriotic to values they do not believe in, of being wary to voice opinions that contradict what TV tells us we all think.


He mocked the demonizing of bin Laden that the U.S. has force-fed to the American people. he U.S. has force-fed to the American people. The eeeeeeviiillll bin Laden! Osaaaamaaaaa bin aaaaaadennnnn," he wailed, voice trembling in

Moore had some questions he wants the U.S. government to answer. One burning query: what is the financial connection between the bin Laden and Bush families? Immediately after the Sept. 11 attacks, Bush's private plane flew around the country and spirited members of the bin Laden family to safety. Hundreds of other people are still being detained by the INS for no reason. Why are the family members of the man who supposedly masterminded the tragedy of the World Trade Centers not being grilled and interrogated by the FBI for evidence? I guess oil runs thicker than

Michael Moore challenged every single person in the CRC to "commit to run for office." Millions of people in this country are waiting for somebody to make something happen. That somebody is YOU. People are waiting for YOU to make it happen. It will only happen when YOU realize that YOU can make it happen.

"We've gotta do this, folks," Moore implored us. "It's so important." It only takes a little action to produce so much. He told inspirational tales from his own life: running for city council at 18 (and being elected), spontaneously protesting against Ronald Reagan honoring the memory of Nazi officers. He also mentioned another small action that sparked a glorious flame: Dec. 1, 1955 – one woman refuses to leave her seat on the bus. "Look what happened!" Every movement, every revolution starts with just a few people, with just one small act. So come on Go do it. It's up to you.

However, I feel there is a much deeper issue worthy of being addressed and acknowledged in order to fully enjoy his presence here and not be bathing in a bath of hypocrisy or shame.

Evergreen is commonly hailed as a haven for political correctness and progressive politics. Despite these intentions, it seems that as a student body, we walk a fine line between promoting positive change and perpetuating racial stereotypes and values. Examining this tightrope is what I intend to do in order to break down the intentions of Evergreen as an institution and Evergreen to the set of the set

Does having a main attraction be a black performance artist at an academic institution that has a sparse population of people of color reinforce our societal norms that require African-Americans to be either entertainers or athletes in order to be successful and not have equal opportunity to be scholars? Or does having the main attraction be a positive black performance artist at a fine academic institution as ours inspire us to be more welcoming to African-American culture and promote students of

my choice, and because of that, kids relate to me." Indeed he needs to support himself financially, but he also feels a responsibility to not compromise his art for the sake of revenue. Because of this lack of compromise that he is so highly respected for, Talib may be forced to play at alternative venues such as Evergreen that promote his artistic freedom and want to support it. On the flip side, Evergreen may see Talib's performance as a lucrative opportunity and seeks to use his artistic freedom to make a profit, despite his deep affiliation with the black Furthermore, there is another side of the issue worthy of being examined: business. Talib Kweli is quoted on his web site as saying, "What I do for a living is rhyme. Thar's my career. I love it, but also it pays my bills. I have a family. But, I don't see any other way to do music unless I make music that has a consciousness to it. That's just my choice, and because of that, kids relate

So, how do we, as a predominately white audience, respond to welcoming Talib Kweli here? I cannot speak for others, but I will attempt to speak for others who may not eacknowledge the need to look at this as a deeper issue. I myself am a fan of hip hop. I feel that supporting quality hip hop and independent artists such as Talib Kweli benefits not only the music industry at large, but also the audience that is exposed and inspired by his art. I do feel, however, that we need to acknowledge the fact that by bringing this big name to campus, Evergreen as an institution must realize that the desire to bring an artist (or entertainer) of color here to study. I am grateful to S&A Productions for bringing artists that can inspire an ethnically diverse student body through art.

I hope we create an environment where we can welcome art from other cultures in an atmosphere that welcomes students of color with the same enthusiasm. Talib Kweli is an artist worth whole-hearted support, but understanding the issue in depth could lead to further support of more multicultural artists and students in the future.

On Friday, May 24, Talib Kweli and the Lifesavas showed off their music skills at The Evergreen State College. Blackalicious had planned on touching down at Evergreen as well, but Gift of Gab, Blackalicious' lyricist, had to take a timeout from the group's tour to heal a foot injury that needed to be taken care of immediately for fear of further complications due to his diabetes.

Nonetheless, the show must go on.

As the crowd made their journey through the gymnasium to the allotted stadium, they were humored by the well-accustomed, thought-provoking booths that are seen randomly on campus. One booth was poking at the idea that money funded for the Student Activities programs had this time brought entertainers who were black, yet received a mainly all-white audience. What this booth failed to recognize was that the DJ of Lifesavas is of Caucasian persuasion; that sound transcends all color borders; and that the Student Activities office makes their decisions on what entertainers they bring to the school as a reflection from the students.

S&A Productions bring in an audience from around the city, which brings money back into the school.

Once the crowd was fully inside the concert arena, the energy got condensed, sounds started, and DJ from Full

House got this party started quickly.

Reverend DJ Shine warmed up the ones-n-twos and out came Versatile and Jumbo the Garbage Man to formally introduce the crowd with Lifesavas, a Portland based hip-hop group that knows what a party needs. With their energetic tempo and sampled sounds, they gave the crowd a recognizable beat. Soon, everybody was moving.

# S&A Board to Recommend Increasing Fees

The Services and Activities Board is faced with the prospect of raising fees. The S&A Board is responsible for allocating money to the various student groups on campus, including the CPJ, EPIC, Students Against Hunger and Homelessness, and the Childcare Center. The S&A Board has not raised fees in three years. Currently, each student pays a total of \$122.33 a quarter, or \$367.00 a year. According to state law, the fee can only be increased in years when tuition

is also increased

There are several reasons why the board would like to increase fees. For one, minimum wage is being increased, meaning that the money paid to student employees has been raised without a concurrent increase in the pool from

which they are paid. The number of student organizations has increased by 24% in the past two years. The cost of staff wages for health care has increased. Finally, the mortgage payment for the new childcare will cost \$60,000 for next

The board cannot increase fees by a higher percentage than tuition will be increased. In other words, if tuition is increased by only 10%, the board will only be allowed to increase the fee by a maximum of 10%.

The S&A board consulted with

students via one-on-one conversations outside the CAB from Monday to Wednesday. S&A Board member Jarrod Hays says he realizes "this is really last minute," but there were no plans to

the board heard about Revised Code of Washington 28B.15.069, the state law that tied any increases in student activity fees to increases in tuition. Not knowing if there will be a chance to increase fees next year, the board has decided to recommend raising them this year, despite the limited chance for student input.

The S&A Board met Wednesday, May 1, at a budget deliberation meeting. After discussing the choices, the board made a final recommendation to the board of trustees, who must ultimately approve all actions by the Board.



From THE OLYMPIAN Postal workers and volunteers collected a record 76,530 pounds of food Saturday from Thurston County mailboxes, an increase of 17,215 pounds from last year.

"It's wonderful -- we really appreciate it," said Jan Putnam, director of the Thurston County Food Bank. The 10th year of the National Association of Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger food drive will help feed an estimated 3,000 to 3,500 people in Thurston County, Putnam said.


The Thurston County Food Bank helps between 1,550 and 1,600 people each month, Putnam said. Saturday's event is the food bank's second largest food drive each year. The local high school food drive is the food bank's largest event. Volunteers were still sorting through the avalanche of food Monday. Putnam said donations increase every year, but the number of hungry people in Thurston County is increasing too. Many low-income families don't have enough money to buy the right amounts of nutritious food, so the food bank supplements their diet, she said.


### 'Always a need'

"There always is a need," Putnam said. "It's not the type of need we've seen in foreign countries, where you see babies with swollen stomachs."

The food bank helps local families balance their diets -- and avoid hunger during lean times, Putnam said.









SEED works to unite nature, culture, and technology to reintegrate the needs of human society within the balance of nature. Ecological design begins with an intimate knowledge of a place. ### Challenges Typical Ideas A Student's Project eaut

"Ideal beauty is white beauty," says student Yuh-Line Niou, who has started a weekly lecture series at Evergreen about how women of color are often considered beautiful in America only if they resemble

Caucasian women.

She's called the series Saving Face: the Representation of Women of Color.

The idea for the lectures sprung from two research papers Niou wrote on the subject earlier this year for her class. She wanted to take what she was learning in class a step further.

Some teachers at Evergreen are specialized in areas regarding race and the challenges facing women of color, says Niou, but they often aren't approached outside their classes to give lectures in their areas of specialty.

For her first lecture, Niou invited faculty

For her first lecture, Niou invited faculty Mario Caro to expand on issues she touched on in her research papers. About 25 students showed up to listen.

In her research papers, Niou wrote that a child can not instantly discern what is considered beautiful. But over time, every child is trained as they grow older to discriminate what is or is not beautiful, and usually what is beautiful is what

approximates Caucasian traits.

The small lips. The light skin. The lighter-colored hair. The wide, not slanted eyes. Eyes colored blue or green.

Niou, who also heads the student group Women of Color, and is Chinese herself, says Asian women sometimes modify their bodies by whitening their skin or getting surgery in order to approximate a western idea of white beauty.

Niou says four or five students in her ose circle of friends have gotten a special elid surgery that makes their eyes look












Chris: Yoga is very popular today. Can you share a few words describing it?

Judith: People today tend to think of yoga as the physical posturing that we learn in classes. It's actually much greater than that. Yoga in its specific definition means union, of which "Hatha Yoga" [physical postures] is a small piece. All of Yoga is about union - a coming together. Specifically to attain that which was previously unattainable. So people come to yoga because there's something that they're wanting.

It's easy to start with Hatha Yoga and the physical postures because the body is very tangible. We can see it, we can touch it, we can move it. And in that exploration we can touch something greater in ourselves. We end up refining what to reach for and the ways of coming together, in union as our practice continues.

Chris: What is the greatest effect of yoga?

Judith: I think the greatest effect is a sense of well-being, which tends to be marked with peace, and an ability to stay yourself and your actions; and the ability to make choices which are to the benefit of yourself and others. centered in chaotic situations; an ability to

Chris: Today we face a precarious moment in the history of the world. Can yoga have an effect on our world as a whole?

Judith; I believe that it can and that is why I teach. I sincerely hope that we can evolve our consciousness as a human race. Yoga's main moral ethic, main code of life is Ahimsa - which is non-harming. It is said that if you can practice Ahimsa and nothing else then you'll have it all. For any yogi that is the highest goal. In today's world, if we can find alternative ways to face the troubles that we face by finding our own center, in the midst of all these problems, to choose a way of nonviolence, then we'll change the world.

Chris: Where can people start if they want to begin a yoga practice on their own

Judith: Yoga traditionally is an oral teaching. It has been handed down orally for thousands of years. The best place to start a yoga practice is to find a good teacher. I know a few people that have learned yoga through a book, but at some point they end up finding a teacher. There is something transferred from teacher to student that you cannot get out of books. So that is the place. To find a teacher.

Now the best way to find a teacher is to follow one's heart. Go to several classes with several different teachers. Every teacher is going to emphasize something different in yoga. So when you go to a class, if that teacher is speaking to your heart, than stay and study there.

Students voted last week on the most powerful student position on campus, and the future of the Evergreen branch of a Ralph Nader-born public policy group. And some of the

WashPIRG (Washington Public Interest Research Group) won on all but about fifty of the 1,346 ballots cast, after doing one of the most extensive flyering, phoning, and canvassing jobs on campus this year. The vote asked students to approve the charge of a six-dollar quarterly fee, which can be waived, to fund WashPIRG's operation. That money goes to the group's state office, which divides the money among the campus branches—so not all of the money Evergreen students pay for WashPIRG Interesting comes back to Evergreen. The group offers students internships, where they work on environmental-preservation and consumer-protection campaigns.
Students were also asked to select next year's student
