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The Evergreen State College Chamber Orchestra, directed by Faculty Member Robert Gottlieb, will present a free public Spring Concert, starting at 8 p.m. May 31 in the main lobby of the Daniel J. Evans Library Building.

The Chamber Orchestra--featuring a mixture of Evergreen musicians and high school students and other residents of the Olympia-Lacey-Tumwater area--will present seven numbers during the program. They include:

"Trumpet Sonata in D Major", by Domenico Gabrielli; "Oboe Concerto in G Major", by D. Dittersdorf; "Aria 'Che faro' from Orfeo", by G. W. Gluck; "Aria 'Ho perduto' from Rodelinda", by Handel; "Recit. and Aria from Dido and Aneas", by H. Purcell; "Concerto Grosso with Piano Obligato", by E. Bloch; and "Rumanian Folk Dances", by B. Bartok.

Jayne Austin, a 16-year-old junior at Olympia High School, will be the featured piano soloist for the Spring Concert. Miss Austin, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip H. Austin of Olympia, has studied piano for eight years. She has performed in numerous music contests throughout Southwest Washington, receiving several superior ratings. Also a violinist, Miss Austin is a member of the Olympia High School Orchestra and Strolling Strings and has played with the Tacoma Youth Symphony for the last three years.

Other featured solists for the Spring Concert include trumpeter Wayne Timmerman, Director of Music at Olympia High School, and Evergreen students Eleanor Hite, oboist; Patty Lott, mezzo soprano; and Mary Zamora, soprano.

Orchestra conductor Gottlieb joined the Evergreen faculty last September after ten years of teaching music at the University of California at Riverside. During that time, he conducted the Riverside University-Community Orchestra and also taught in India under a Fulbright Lectureship and through a grant from the American Institute of Indian Studies.
