January 15th marks the birth of Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., one of this country's greatest Black civil rights

Entertainer Stevie Wonder called for a demonstration during a press conference on November 25th to march on Washington, D.C., January 15th to show Congress the community support behind the movement. Fifteen states have already ratified January 15th as a state holiday - Washington state is not among them. The Pan African Student Association of Washington State (PASAW) in support of the national movement, will meet at TESC on January 15th at 10:30am, then proceed to the Capitol Rotunda in force. A petition will be submitted to the Governor requesting January 15th be made a Washington state holiday in commemoration of Martin Luther King, Jr. There will also be a musical program from 11:30 to 1:30 in celebration and memory of this great Black leader.
