

Carie Lynn Cable of Tacoma, a 1972 graduate of the University of Washington, has been appointed to the faculty of The Evergreen State College, according to Vice President and Provost David G. Barry. The appointment is effective September 15.

Miss Cable received a bachelor's degree in anthropology last June and currently is enrolled for summer studies in the University of Washington's Advanced Archeology Field School. A 1965 graduate of Tacoma's Clover Park High School, she has studied at Pacific Lutheran University; Beloit College, Wisconsin; and Sophia University, Tokyo, Japan.

While in Japan she undertook extensive social, cultural, and language research studies and in 1970 served as an English instructor at Nippei Densui School in Tokyo.

She also was a reader in the University of Washington's Department of Anthropology in 1972.

Meanwhile, two other academic appointments have been announced by Barry.

Bernard Johansen, formerly of Rochester, Minnesota and now Artistic Director for Ballet Northwest in Olympia, will become a half-time member of Evergreen's faculty on September 15. His academic field is dance.

Johansen was Chairman of the Ballet Department at College of Saint Teresa,
Minnesota from 1965 to 1971 and has been an instructor at both Andahazy School of
Classical Ballet in Minnesota and Viterbo College in Wisconsin. He operated his own
school of dance in Rochester, Minnesota prior to moving to Olympia in July and is
a former director and soloist with the Rochester Ballet Company, the Southern Minnesota
Ballet, and Minnesota Collegiate Ballet Company.

And, Howard Gallup, presently an Associate Professor of Psychology at Lafayette

College, Easton, Pennsylvania, has been appointed as a visiting member of the faculty at Evergreen, effective March 26, 1973 and running through June 15, 1973.

"Dr. Gallup is one of several instructors from across the nation we expect to visit Evergreen as a short-term faculty member in future years," Barry said.

"Visiting instructors are attracted here because of Evergreen's growing reputation in national higher education circles. We welcome their participation in our programs not only because of the experience and talent they bring us but also because they can take what they learn about us back to their institutions."

Gallup has been an instructor at Lafayette College since 1958 and is a former teacher at Hobart and William Smith Colleges, Geneva, New York, and at the University of Pennsylvania. He was resident psychologist at the Philadelphia Navy Yard in 1955 and 1956.

He received his bachelor's degree from Rutgers University in 1950 and his master's and doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania in 1953 and 1957, respectively.
