Three students from The Evergreen State College have begun internships at two Pacific Northwest Job Corps Centers according to Ken Donohue, the college's Director of Cooperative Education.

Funded by a \$13,312 grant from the U.S. Department of Labor, two students are working as teaching assistants at the Columbia Basin Job Corps Center in Moses Lake.

The two, Eldon Vail, Auburn, and Eric Anderson, Seattle, began their one-year internships in July and will help provide vocational and classroom training for culturally and educationally deprived persons at the Center, Donohue said.

"Two additional students will be assigned to the Moses Lake center in the fall," he added. "One will work in recreation and organized activities and the other will provide career, employment and personal counseling."

Students in the one-year program receive a regular salary in addition to their room and board as part of the federal grant.

The Moses Lake project, which is supported by Evergreen's first major Cooperative Education grant from the federal government, is a pilot program and may be expanded next year if it is successful, Donohue said.

A second grant, for \$1,100, has provided for a one-quarter internship program at the Mount Angel, Oregon Job Corps Center. Terry Billedeaux, an Evergreen student from woodland, began work there in July.
