

Lions and Tigers and TESCrier

A reported black bear sighting on Evergreen Parkway on Monday September 24, sparked a flurry of emails between faculty and staff. The emails covered a large range of topics including personal anecdotes, tips, links, and worries about safety on campus.

One email in particular brought up the issue of students picking berries in

the forest and venturing down the trails to the beach. The middle of September to the beginning of October marks one of the main seasons for salmon in Washington waters, and the potential of bears fishing in the waters by campus increases.

This doesn't seem to bother the Evergreen cross-country coaches.

Most of the team's practices occur on the trails by the athletic fields or along the

roads around campus, though some of

the runners take to the beach trails for recovery runs. Head coach Malcom Dunn made sure his athletes were prepared if they came across a bear, but he wasn't worried.

Dunn told his runners in jest, "just be faster than one of the people you're running with."

He's not a stranger to coming across wildlife when exercising in the woods, having come across bears in the Blue Mountains while coaching for Whitman College, and nearly stepping on a rattle-snake in eastern Washington.

There haven't been any exciting wildlife encounters at Evergreen though.

"We see deer quite regularly," Dunn said indifferently, before adding that he thought the bear sighting had never been actually confirmed. Campus police sergeant Tim Marron released a statement to faculty and staff via email about the sighting. Marron was unavailable to comment.

While the cross country team doesn't plan on changing their running trails anytime soon, the danger of a bear on



campus does bring up the question of student safety. The same email that discussed students hiking to the beach, posited the idea of posting signs along the forest trails.

Paul Smith, Facilities Services Director, confirmed that no one had approached Facilities about placing wildlife signs along the trails since most signs along the trails are taken down as soon as they are posted.

"This is the first time in the seven years that I have been here that a bear has been sighted anywhere close to the college," said Smith.

A few staff mentioned previous sightings and encounters with bears during their time at Evergreen, but nothing as of yet has been verified. This lengthy discussion unfolded on the faculty and staff email distribution list, while only a brief forward of the reported sighting was sent out via TESCrier to students.
TESCrier, an "opt-in" email sub-

scription for Evergreen students, sends out announcements regarding campus community events. Within the myevergreen.edu profile of every student, there is the option to sign up for TESCrier or TESCtalk, the campus-wide discussion forum. A major issue with these modes of communication for the Evergreen community is the difficulty distinguishing the purpose of each. TESCrier is for announcing events, while TESCtalk is for discussing events, issues, and things of relevance to the community.

Many students get fed up with the constant barrage of emails and simply cancel the service. Only an approximate 20 percent of students subscribe to TESCrier. This leaves 80 percent of students unaware of a potential bear in the woods, among other important announcements.

On the agenda of Student Affairs for the upcoming year is the examination of TESCrier and exploring an alternative mode of communication with students. Currently, the Internal Communications committee, a continuation of the previous Student Technology Communications work group, has been discussing the idea of a different forum.

Student Activities Senior Advisor and Internal Communications committee member, Courtney Bailey, said the idea is not in "taking away the basic concepts of TESCrier and TESCtalk, but looking for an alternative format that might be more effective and useful for the campus."

The under utilization of announcement systems such as TESCrier in the Evergreen community is also seen with the e2Campus notification system.

Another "opt-in" system for getting information to the community, e2Campus, sends out alerts via email or text when there are campus closures due to severe weather or similar emergencies. Theoretically, the e2Campus system could be considered a great communication system.

Jason Wettstein, Media and Community Relations Manager, feels e2Campus

is "simply the most reliable way of getting information sent" because the system isn't connected to the campus servers. This way, when the power goes out on campus, and students need to know about class being cancelled, the e2Campus system can still be up and sending out notifications.

However, only a little over half of students and staff are signed up for the alerts. This is one of the better statistics for e2Campus in comparison to other schools who use the system.

"The philosophy behind it is that if students sign up for (e2Campus), they're likely to provide their best cell phone, best email, the way they're going to be reached easiest," said Wettstein. The problem is getting students to sign up for it in the first place.

A link to the e2Campus notification sign-up can be found on the home page of The Evergreen State College website, but many overlook the link, or simply turn to other means of getting their information.

Wettstein agreed that "no communication system can be fool proof" but, "the idea is to try to layer different types of communication," in order for all students to become informed.

Overall, Evergreen has been taking steps to improve student safety and they are continuing to improve upon the communication methods.

The lights in the parking lot have been upgraded and downsized. Instead of towering above the trees and the light getting obstructed by branches, the poles have been lowered below the tree level and are substantially brighter. Around campus, the blue emergency stations have undergone upgrades and are being retrofitted with equipment for the "big voice" system. Fire alarm systems throughout Evergreen are also being equipped to utilize the "big voice" system that was once only available in the student housing.

The communication systems on campus are respectable, but communication isn't a one-way street. In order for these notification systems to be helpful for students, they need student participation. There had been talk in the past of having notification systems in which students are signed up automatically, but they decided to have opt-in systems instead to give students the choice. Not to mention, the school isn't the only source for information, especially for weather emergencies. Local news and radio stations are always a good place to find information about school closures.

College Statement

What happened?

On Wednesday, Sep. 26th, an Evergreen lifeguard and an adult female affiliated with a local swim club were alerted that a swim team member had observed what she believed was a man unclothed in the women's locker room of the College Recreation Center. - the locker room was also occupied by several dozen young female swimmers. The person in question was a transgender Evergreen student who identifies as female. Believing that the student was a male, the individual from the swim club confronted her and demanded that she leave. Campus police were also called. While the situation was ultimately explained and the individual from the swim club apologized, the occurrence raised questions about the college's policy regarding facilities access for transgender individuals.

What's the college's policy?

In accordance with state law and college policy, the college does not discriminate on the basis of sexual orientation or

gender identity. Transgender individuals are afforded the opportunity to determine appropriate facility access based on their gender identity.

How is the college responding?

We have an obligation to uphold the civil rights of all individuals using our facilities and we will be working collaboratively with various stakeholders to identify a balanced approach that allows us to do

Washington State Law and college policy forbid discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity so transgender individuals will continue to have access to college facilities. As we move ahead, our approach may include modifications in facilities or other measures to minimize concerns for all facility users.

We do not have all the answers now, but we are researching and considering options to ensure everyone's safety and fair use of the facilities; including options to increase everyone's right to privacy.

Mixed Bag as Geoducks Return From Oregon

Men's soccer continues its hot streak with a brief hiccup, women falter in spite of wizardry by their keeper, and cross country competes all across state lines

After a week mostly spent across the border, our Geoducks returned from their matches and invitationals with mixed results.

The Lady Geoducks' Soccer team struggled in a double header on Saturday and Sunday, first losing a close match to Southern Oregon 0-1 followed by a disappointing blowout against Oregon Tech that ended up being 0-5 in spite of keeper Lauren Davidson's (junior) 10 saves.

The Men's Soccer team continued their strong conference play, going 3-1 over a 10 day stretch including a 3-1 win over Corban

University, a 2-1 win over Warner Pacific, a 0-2 loss to Concordia University, before righting the ship with a 4-0 win over Northwest University.

With a 5-1 conference record, the team has been tested many times, but keeps coming through, no more apparent than in the exciting Corban game that started off this last stretch of matches.

Facing arguably their toughest opponent yet, Evergreen got off to a hot start as Willie Spurr (freshman) continued his hot streak after winning Red Lion CCC Offensive Player of the Week by scoring the first goal of the game, followed by putting it off the feet of an opponent for an own goal, sending the Geoducks into halftime with a 2-0 lead.

Just minutes into the second half though, Corban scored off an assist to narrow the gap off a well-timed assist. Just under ten minutes later, Captain Brady Espinoza (junior) drilled

in a 30-yard free kick to secure the lead and the win.

Though the game was much closer than the score, keeper Collin Harlow (junior) was spectacular in the net, refusing to allow Corban to take the lead in spite of the fact they got off more shots than the Geoducks.

In other news, Evergreen Cross Country ran at the 38th Annual Charles Bowles Invitational in Salem, Oregon this weekend, hosted by Willamette University.

Aaron Jones (sophmore) and Ashley Di-Cristina (senior) were the top men's and women's finishers among the Geoducks. Their next meet will be in two weeks at Warner Pacific in Portland.


What's next for you?

Olympia bluegrass duo make a name for thesmelves with studio debut

Even before we heard Science!'s self-titled studio debut, they were quickly becoming one of the most talked about bands in Olympia. The duo was voted "best new Olympia band" by The Weekly Volcano probably because they are so damn easy to listen to.

Science! is the duo's first album with a full band and Glen Graham of Blind

Melon on drums. It is available now for free streaming or \$7.00 download at scienceseattle.bandcamp.com.

There is nothing particularly innovative on their self-released 7-track EP. The two guitarists take off where The Grateful Dead's "Touch of Grey" left off, with a more up-tempo, bluesy twist — which means they sound like Dispatch. "Austin Tune" could be straight from the Dead's catalogue, with Stang's raspy vocals and the ever-wandering guitar solos.

Like The Grateful Dead, Science! finds a sweet balance between country, bluegrass and blues.

Despite their lack of imagination, they will no doubt hit the spot for many mature listeners looking to give their car stereos a break from The String Cheese Incident and Dave Matthew's Band on the way to the farmers market.

Their songs are adult and catchy (point and case: the soulful blues hook on "You and Rachel"), yet they maintain the kind of unkempt vibe that will win over younger Olympians who appreciate rugged bluegrass.



LP Review: SHIELDS | Grizzly Bear

Grizzly Bear break the confines of art-gallery rock with their new LP Shields, released September 18 on Warp Records. The Brooklyn quartet brings a Baroque flair to cutting edge **rhythms** on their sublimely complex fourth studio album. It is their first release since 2009's hit Veckatimest, and, joyfully, the band brings the same pop sensibility as before, but with more maturity. Ecstatic melodies blend with musical intelligence on their single "Yet Again." This track in particular, brooding and uplifting, is as powerful as they come.

The experimental tendencies on this record are along the lines of Wilco's Yankee Hotel Foxtrot, but with no trace of Jeff Tweedy's fragility or distance. Instead, Grizzly Bear relies on heavy and exhilarating rhythm parts such as on the opening track "Sleeping Ute." With Shields, Grizzly Bear has surpassed any of their previous work, and set an ambitious standard for future releases.

Riot to Follow Pull Off "Complete Works" Despite Set-Backs

No one, it seems, takes to heart the phrase, "The show must go on," like the Riot to Follow Theater. True to their craft, the company of players made do spectacularly with Lecture Hall I, transforming it from a traditional classroom into a theater complete with a balcony (for Romeo & Juliet, of course) and backstage area.

The three person cast of "The Complete Works of Shakespeare [Abridged]," showed resilience as a last minute absence left Director Patrick Gilmore the responsibility of filling in for Camille Boults after a traumatic head injury.

However, the gender swap arguably

added to the comedic effect. The role was originally written for a male actor, and references his horrible taste in wigs during a scene in which he plays Ophelia.

Though neither the set nor the cast worked out as originally intended, Riot To Follow executed the Reduced Shakespeare Company's rendition of the Bard's works wonderfully and enthusiastically — the lofty lecture hall quickly filled with laughter from the audience. It reminded everyone, no doubt, of the best and worst moments of their high school English classes, inviting culture into the brains of the relatively unwitting.



Devil's Breakfast

What you need:

4 eggs

4 button mushrooms
3 strips of bacon
1/4 cup shredded cheese
2 to 3 tablespoons mayonnaise

1 teaspoon butter a pinch of salt



In a small pot, boil the eggs over medium-high heat for 12 minutes. Remove the eggs and run them under cold water until cool, then peel them. Cut each egg in half and remove the yolks. Put the yolks in a small mixing bowl and set those aside. Cut the mushrooms and bacon into teeny tiny pieces (I recommend using scissors to cut the bacon) and fry them over high heat. Toss the fried mushrooms and bacon into the bowl with the yolks, add the mayonnaise and salt, and stir thoroughly. Spoon the mixture back into the holes in the egg whites, sprinkle the shredded cheese on top, chill, and serve.
