The psychological distinctions between humans and other animals will be analyzed by Dr. Richard Jones April 27 in the fifth of The Evergreen State College Spring Quarter Lecture Series. The free address is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in Lecture Hall Three.

A psychologist and member of the Evergreen faculty since 1970, Dr. Jones will emphasize humanity's imaginative functions as exemplified by dreams and dreaming. His Wednesday evening address will also discuss some of the recent archeological findings which, he says, "show that human imagination hasn't changed much in the past 25 thousand years."

Creator of the dream reflection seminar, an academic method for studying human dreams, Dr. Jones is a nationally recognized authority on dreams. He has recently completed his eighth book "Dream Reflection in Education," which will be published next year by Shenckman Publishing Company of Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Prior to joining Evergreen's planning faculty, he served as chief of psychological services for the Massachusetts Department of Mental Health and as a professor of education at Harvard University. He has written more than 20 research articles and eight books on psychology, education and dreaming.

A Phi Beta Kappa scholar, Dr. Jones earned his bachelor's degree in psychology from Stanford University and his doctorate in clinical psychology from Harvard. His evening address is free and open to the public.
