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MLK Day march at Capitol





Evergreen's Nate Menefee in national spotlight

Conference (CCC) Player of the Week for the third time of the 2009-10 season, Nate Menefee was announced as National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Player of the Week.

Both awards were given to Menefee as a result of his outstanding play over the past weekend against Concordia University of Portland and the nationally ranked Warner Pacific College. The former, Menefee torched for 38 points in a 107-97 blowout while he added 4 rebounds, 5 assists, and 3 steals. Menefee's 38 point performance marked the seventh time he's scored over 30 points in a game this season. Against the WPC Knights, Menefee had 25 points, 4 rebounds and 5 steals. In two games,

the senior Geoduck team captain managed to scorch his opponents with 63 points, 8 rebounds, 8 steals, Just one day after receiving Cascade Collegiate and 7 assists. The Tacoma native also played every minute of both games accumulating 80 minutes out of a possible 80.

> Menefee leads the CCC in points per game as the only player in the conference averaging over 20 points per game with 27.5. The next closest player is WPC's Jake Glisson with 19.1 per game. Menefee also leads the conference in steals with 55 total this year, averaging 2.89 a game.

> Nationally, the Geoduck senior ranks among the top 30 in three major categories, points (3rd), steals (14th) and assists (28th).







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Men's basketball unstoppable in Oregon

The Evergreen men's basketball team was on the road this weekend in Portland, Ore., to take on Cascade Collegiate Conference powerhouse Warner Pacific University and Concordia University.

Friday night (Jan. 15)

In game one of two of Evergreen's road trip, the Geoducks faced off against Concordia University in Cavalier Gymnasium in Portland, Ore. The Cavaliers proved to be no match for the Geoducks as they fell to Evergreen by 10 points in a 107-97 loss. The Geoducks sank 8 three's in the first half on top of 18-40 shooting in the first half to go into the locker room at halftime 54-51.

Concordia could not match Evergreen's intensity in the second half and the Geoducks began to pull away with superior shooting and scrappy defense. The Geoducks out shot the Cavs in every category in this conference slugfest. Nate Menefee was his normal self leading all scorers with 38 points, adding 4 rebounds, 5 assists, and 3 steals to his line. Most impressive of all Menefee's stats was his near perfect 17-18 shooting from the

added another 15 points and 6 rebounds to Evergreen's total while Ben Wilson and Desmond Martin had 14 points each.

Saturday night (Jan. 16)

Game two of two would prove to be a tough test for the up and coming Geoducks, for they would be taking on the nationally ranked Warner Pacific College Knights.

WPC jumped out on Evergreen 36-31 in the first half in front of a crowd of 500 screaming fans.

The Geoducks improved their shooting in the second half and stayed close to the very end, nipping Warner Pacific by one point with a final score that read 73-72. Nate Menefee again led all scorers with 25 points and showed his defensive prowess, grabbing 5 steals from the Knights. Julio Feliciano bamboozled WPC with a doubledouble scoring 11 points and snatching 12 rebounds which proved to be huge in this match-up. Warner Pacific out-rebounded the Geoducks 50-35, so every rebound Evergreen pulled down was an important one. Another notable Evergreen performance was that of Josh Troyer's 21 point, 5 rebound and 4 steal showing in the CCC squeaker. The Geoducks complicated the

free throw line on the night. Josh Troyer CCC standings with their two wins this weekend, putting themselves in a four-way tie at the top at 7-2 in conference play. Oregon Tech, Warner Pacific, and Oregon Tech are the other three in a dead heat with E-State going into this weekend.

> Player of the Weekend: Nate Menefee-While Menefee accounted for 59 points, 8 rebounds, and 8 steals it is also important to note that he played in every single minute of both games. That is 80 minutes out of 80 in two nights of basketball. Menefee is the third leading scorer in the country in NAIA Division II basketball.

> This Weekend: The Geoducks are back home for a two-game home stand that welcomes Northwest Christian University and Corban College. Both teams hail from Oregon, and the Geoducks hope to spoil their roadtrip by improving upon their 7-2 conference record and hopefully move up in the CCC standings before it's all said and done. The Geoducks tip off at 7:30 p.m. on both nights. Admission is free for Evergreen students with ID.



Though Ben Anderson has always been an entrepreneur, he has never been in business for the money.

"I've been selling lemonade and doing a bike shop since I can remember, you know, it was like anytime playing out in the yard, it was like let's sell this or make this or let's have a bike repair thing. And it wasn't like about money; it was about helping other people.

"I grew up in my family's business with selling Sky Chairs and going to arts and crafts shows. The first business I ever owned was Big Chief Indian Goods. I was about 12 years old and I sewed pouches, I made dream catchers, earrings, necklaces and key-chains out of leather. I had my buddies from school work for me and we made these arts and crafts and sold 'em at craft fairs."

When Ben was first accepted to Evergreen in 2000, he initially took science courses but dropped out because he'd felt partying was more important than academics. Ben returned to Evergreen in 2006, and that was when he first started considering business as an academic major.

"My friend Tanner in my first class at Evergreen in [2006] said 'Ben, you like business, why don't you take a business program?"

Since then, Ben has been studying business and is currently in an internship with the Thurston County Chamber of Commerce.

"I got hired with the Thurston County Chamber of Commerce in the summer. They hadn't really advertised it as an internship, but they said, 'Well, what are you going to do when school comes around?' and I said, 'I'm going to turn this into my senior year class.'

"I'm tutoring with the QuaSR [center]

also. Economics, business, finance, accounting, everything Evergreen has taught me in the last three years about business, I get to tutor. It's fun. You get to put your own liberal twist on things also.

"I'm a lefty all the way, I'm a liberal, you know. We have left of left here at Evergreen, and even more left in anarchists."

Though Ben is a liberal at heart, he can often been seen wearing suits, ties, and shirts with collars so that he'll be taken seriously as a contender in the business world.

"In high school I was a long haired hippie, tie-dye shirts ... I was in punk bands all throughout high school.


"My dad says I'm a sheep in wolf's clothing ... or would it be wolf in sheep's clothing?"

Though he has his concerns about the current economic atmosphere, Ben seems excited to graduate this year and apply what he has learned at Evergreen to the real world.

"I'm passionate about working with youth, working with inmates and giving back to the community and Evergreen has been a portal to do that, huge. There's so much opportunity here at Evergreen."

"We find our little niches where we can



thrive in this community.

"Evergreen has prepared me ... here at Evergreen you're given enough line to hang yourself with and I mean that in a sense where you have so much freedom that you can do what you want and probably get by and not do much for four years...or you can tear this thing up. Take advantage of every resource and opportunity to us and become big fish in this little campus. Which isn't an ego thing, but it just means we're going to leave Evergreen with skills other people from other colleges may or may not have.

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



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
