What this means: Most License tabs will be \$30; voter approval will be required for all new taxes and fees (ranging from library fines to property tax increases). Washington will become the only state with such a measure.

Further fall-out will probably include road construction delays, cutting of government jobs, reduction in bus service, and possibly even a property tax initiative to stave off possible emergencies.

This initiative is estimated to cost the state treasury about \$750 million a year. It may be unconstitutional due to breaking rules on single topic initiatives, taking taxing and lawmaking approval from the legislature, and amending the state Constitution illegally.

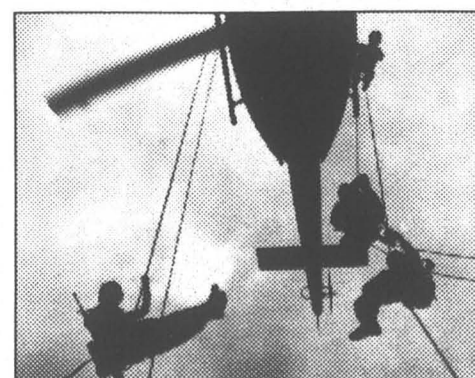

Ramona Africa to speak at Evergreen

Last week, Michael Killeen and Elizabeth Mekuria wrote a succinct article on Mumia Abu-Jamal. At the time their article went to print, Tom Ridge, the governor of Pennsylvania, had signed Mumia's death warrant and he was scheduled to be executed on Dec. 2. Fortunately for Mumia and his supporters, that situation has changed. On Tuesday, Oct. 26, Mumia was granted a stay of execution. What this means is that by Dec. 7, Leonard Weinglass and his associates must petition the courts on why they want to petition for a Habeas Corpus. Judge Yohn, the presiding judge, will then have sixty days to respond to this petition. If Judge Yohn will hear the appeal, Weinglass and associates will ask for an evidentiary hearing.

Some of you may be tired of hearing about Mumia but I think that it is crucial to understand the role that TESC has played in making Mumia Abu-Jamal somewhat of a household name. The heated media debates around the choice to include a speech by Mumia in the 1999 Graduation Ceremony spawned a national and international dialogue for both opponents and supporters of Mumia. Unfortunately, many of us only heard the negative responses to having Mumia's speech played. Something that the mainstream media and the school

administration won't tell us is that we were honored and supported by many people and organizations. For example, Refuse and Resist! A national anti-oppression organization, granted TESC students, faculty and President Jane L. Jervis a Courageous Resistor Award for "standing firm against police and governmental protest." Among others that received awards were: Adrienne Rich, poet and activist; Abner Lous, a victim of police brutality who stood up against them and won, and many others.

International Solidarity was strong. On June 16, Mumia Abu-Jamal supporters from France, Africa, and America confronted Bill Clinton at the American Library in Paris. This direct action was in solidarity and support of TESC and of Mumia being a part of the commencement ceremony. These supporters delivered a manifesto to Clinton and the other attendees at the library. The following is the first part of the manifesto:

"We are here today in solidarity with the students of Evergreen College in Washington State and in support of their firm resolve to maintain their choice of a message from Mumia Abu-Jamal as their Commencement Speech against state and government and police pressure."

This kind of support is what we should all be aware of, especially for those of us that support Mumia and become

bogged down by the negative portrayals in the mainstream media. On Wednesday, Nov. 10, the TESC and Olympia community will have a chance to hear from some voices that have been silenced in the media. Ramona Africa, member of the MOVE organization in Philadelphia and a central coordinator for International Concerned Friends and Family of Mumia Abu-Jamal, will be giving a teach-in on Mumia. This teach-in will take place in the Library Lobby at noon. It will also address the ways that Mumia is connected to the World Trade Organization, Leonard Peltier and the Resistance at Big Mountain, AZ. If you do not get a chance to hear Ramona speak on campus, she will also be speaking at the Tacoma campus at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 10. Ramona will also be speaking Thursday, Nov. 11 in Olympia at 8 p.m. at Bread and Roses (114 Cherry St.).

There are many things that people can do to help Mumia. One way is to write letters to Judge Yohn asking him for an evidentiary hearing. Many student groups have copies of these letters; all you need to do is sign them. Please contact The Evergreen Political Information Center (EPIC) at x6144 if you would like to send a letter to Judge Yohn. Another way to get involved is to come to the Olympia Mumia Defense Council meetings which are on Thursdays at 7 p.m. at the Bread and Roses Kitchen. So will I get a better spot? DTF discusses parking issues

As most of you know, our parking lots are very congested. As we grow to 5,000 students by 2010-2011, our need for additional parking is likely to increase, and we will be required by code to add additional parking spaces as part of the construction of Seminar II. A consultant hired by the college estimates that to accommodate our growth we will need an additional 520 stalls, which is the approximate size of Parking Lot B. Since parking lot construction is funded from the sale of parking permits, the addition of these spaces is likely to result in dramatic increases in the cost of parking permits. Research done this summer suggests that adding 520 parking spaces could result in a doubling of the cost of a parking permit. The purpose of this letter is to update the campus community on the process we have planned to address parking expansion issues.

I am convening a Parking Expansion Disappearing Task Force (DTF). The faculty, staff, and student members of the DTF include Wendy Freeman (chair), Thad Curtz, Michel George, Doug Hitch, Steve Huntsberry, Linda Kahan, Mark Lacina, Trevor Lytle, Masao Sugiyama, Timothy Quinn, and Bill Zaugg. The DTF is being

charged to develop a plan to increase the number of parking spaces on campus, to consider options to reduce vehicular traffic on campus, to examine the current management and operation of our lots, to incorporate steps for the maintenance and repair of our current lots, and to forward a funding plan to support their proposals. The DTF is being asked to complete its work by February 1 and to engage in extensive consultation with the Evergreen community. The complete DTF charge is available from my office and soon will be published on the Evergreen Web site.

At the same time that the DTF is doing its work, the college is seeking a change in the Washington Administrative Code (WAC). Currently, Evergreen's parking fees are published as part of WAC 174-116-040. Any revisions to the WAC, including any changes in Evergreen's parking fees, must be made through a process coordinated by the legislature's Office of the Code Reviser. Evergreen is the only college or university in the state that sets parking fees in this way. The proposed change removes specific parking fees from the WAC and creates a process that the college will use to set parking fees in the future. The proposed process calls for a public hearing on campus on parking fees and the delegation of the authority to set

parking fees to the president of the college. The complete text of the proposed rule change is available from my office. An on-campus hearing to discuss the changes in the WAC is set for November 10 from 4:00 to 5:00 in Library 1612. Please note that the issues under consideration at the November 10 hearing do not include the plan for parking expansion or amount of proposed increases in parking fees. Recommendations for changes in these areas are part of the DTF's charge.



Fertility awareness and birth control

Class offers alternative methods to prevent pregnancy

An upcoming class on a natural method of birth control called Fertility Awareness is being sponsored by the Student Health Center. Fertility awareness is a natural method of birth control that is easy to use and has a 98-99 percent effectiveness rate for women who learn the method well and observe their body signs carefully by writing it down on a daily chart. Fertility Awareness is based on the observation and charting of scientifically proven fertility signs in a woman's body.

This method was made known to Western culture in the early 1960s by two Australian physicians, Evelyn and John Billings. They studied a group of women who observed and charted the daily changes in the sensation and consistency of their cervical fluid. The Billings' compared these women's charts to their daily blood and urine hormone levels and found a direct correlation between the quality of the cervical fluid and fertility. From these findings, they began teaching The Ovulation Method.

Between 1972 and 1990, 17 studies conducted in 11 different countries spanning 17,525 couples showed The Ovulation Method averaged 99 percent 'method' effectiveness for those who applied it correctly, according to a report from the World Health Organization.

Method effectiveness defines how the method works if used correctly. User effectiveness takes into account the failure of an individual to perform the correct steps. (remembering to take the pill, or observing and charting.) According to Toni Weschler in Taking Charge of your Fertility, the user effectiveness of fertility awareness is 88-90 percent.

From 1976 to 1995, more than 28 books were written documenting the three primary fertility signs in a woman's body: cervical fluid, waking body temperature, and changes in the shape and position of the cervix. By observing these changes on a daily basis, a woman can know precisely when she is fertile. To avoid a pregnancy, couples using The Ovulation Method would abstain from sexual intercourse during this time. Fertility Awareness is the terminology that would apply to couples who

use barrier methods (condoms, diaphragm, and cervical cap) during the fertile phase of the cycle rather than abstinence.

Fertility Awareness allows women to avoid the use of synthetic hormones (birth control pills, Depo-Provera, and Norplant) which alter a woman's natural hormonal balance and have many potentially harmful side effects. These include serious complications such as strokes, heart attacks, and breast cancer. Depo-Provera injections have a known side effect of bleeding irregularities (amenorrhea) in 55-68 percent of women who use them and sometimes infertility continues for an extended period of time after the injections are discontinued. Depo-Provera injections are also recommended by medical practitioners for breastfeeding women, even though the drug can be detected in their breast milk. Synthetic hormones impair normal fertility, and interfere with a woman's natural ebbs and flows of estrogen and progesterone. While these chemicals are convenient and require little or no effort, they can also have a profound effect on sexual drive and emotions.

There are several reasons natural birth control is not more widely accepted and promoted by the medical community. First of all, it is generally confused with the rhythm method, which does not work. The rhythm method tries to statistically predict a woman's fertile phase in her upcoming cycle by charting past cycles. This does not take into account changes or delays in ovulation due to stress, diet, light, medications, illness, and other factors. Hence the old joke: what do you call

rhythm method users? Parents. Fertility Awareness is not rhythm, it is awareness.

Secondly, allopathic medicine is largely influenced by pharmaceutical companies that do not profit from people who take responsibility for their own health care or birth control. Most people who inquire about natural methods at doctors' offices are simply told that they do not work. The Student Health Center at Evergreen is a refreshing exception to this as they have been sponsoring Fertility Awareness classes and promoting it to interested students for several years.

Fertility Awareness is best suited to couples in monogamous, stable relationships who are not concerned about the use of condoms to prevent STDs.

Aside from birth control, there are also the added benefits of increased communication between partners, improved understanding of sexuality, enhanced health awareness and greater peace of mind in avoiding pregnancy. Fertility Awareness can also be used by couples with infertility problems who want more knowledge about natural pregnancy achievement.

If you choose to learn Fertility Awareness, it is best to take a class from a qualified teacher. Judy Hickmann, Certified Fertility Educator is offering the next class on Fertility Awareness on Nov. 10 and 17 at 6:30 p.m. The class will be located in the Library, room 2219. This class is being sponsored by The Student Health Center. The cost is \$45 per individual or couple. Book fee (optional) is \$8. If you wish to register for this class, please call Judy at 446-3640.

Walker said that he's looking forward to next season since the team might be in a conference rather than an independent team. "Our team goal is to make the playoffs," he said, "and I think it's possible if we work hard and train together." Walker also played all eighteen

games.

Senior and Captain Jeremy Segel-Moss said that overall the team was better than last year. "We left the season smiling even though we lost as many games as we did," Moss said, "it was a positive experience." Moss, who needed eight credits to graduate, came back to Evergreen just to play soccer and was glad that he did. "Our last game was better than our first game and that's the goal of any soccer season," said Moss, "Every game we did better, even though we were losing."

The women's soccer team also finished the season with no wins.

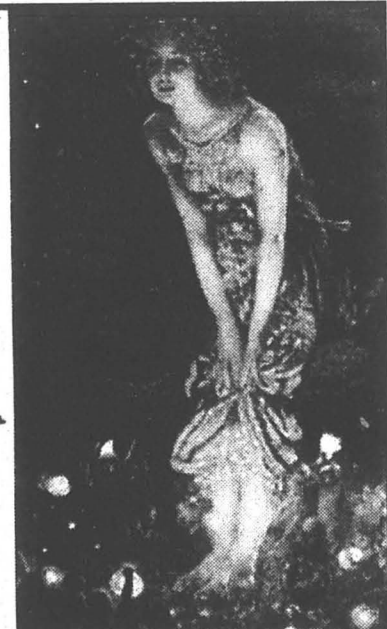

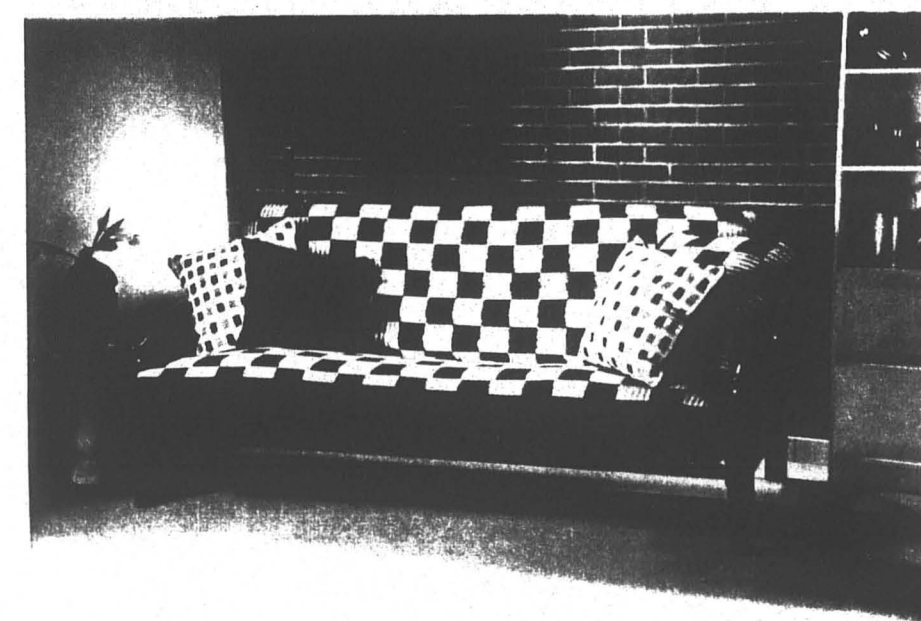

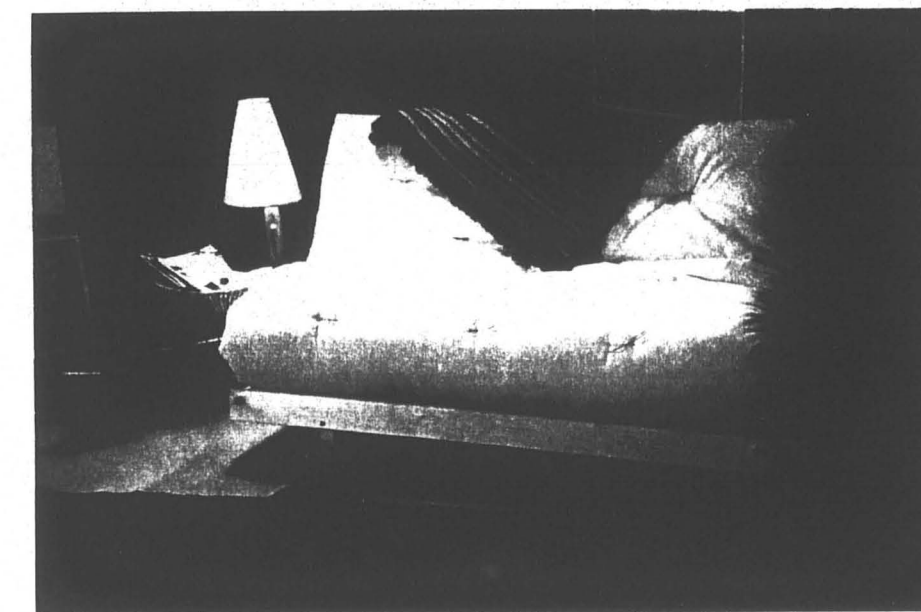

Presidential Search Committee Concealed

Look around for yourself. You'll have probably already noticed some of the pamphlets and graffiti on campus proclaiming that the World Trade Organization and its evil ways must be stopped. Evergreen President Jane Jervis is retiring at the end of this year and the quest is on to find a replacement.

A Presidential Search Committee has been formed to solicit applications and nominations for the position of President. Advertisements for the opening have been placed in various newspapers and magazines, while Jane Jervis and one of the academic deans, John Cushing, have been mailing letters to various destinations asking for people that could be nominated to the post.

The search committee already has 60 completed applications and 27 incomplete applications. Applications will continue to be accepted until the search committee selects the finalists. In January, the search committee will narrow the field to 12 applicants. Five of these people will become the finalists and their applications will be sent to the Board of Trustees to make the final decision.

Mumia: Just Another Asinine Student Movement

This country has a long history of its affluent college students protesting anything that they think may prove they are revolutionaries too. It is through these asinine and foolishly organized movements that the face of freedom and the lies of democracy are allowed to pervade our political and social system. In addition, I must say that the "resistance" to the fulfilling of Mumia's sentence is **among** the most asinine. Obrador, a northwest-based musical group, will be hitting the stage at the State theater downtown on Friday, November 5th in support of their Guanabacoa Project.

The group traveled to Cuba in 1998 and were given a special concert in the poverty-stricken town of Guanabacoa by the students of the Escuela de Musica del Municipio de Guanabacoa (The School of Music in the Municipality of Guanabacoa). The school, housed in a partially condemned building, holds music classes for 230 children ages 6 to 14, who learn to play on donated instruments fifteen hours a week. All children who wish to join the program are allowed, and are trained in voice and piano as well as European classical and traditional Cuban musical forms.

Obrador was struck by the enthusiasm and talent that the students displayed, and have started the Obrador Guanabacoa Project to help bring functional musical instruments to the school. Currently, students are limited to sharing the



few functional instruments they have among the entire group. Obrador has decided to donate the proceeds of their upcoming CD "Obrador: Live in Havana" towards buying

instruments for the school. Cash donations, as well as donations of musical instruments, are greatly appreciated, and will help keep the program in Cuba alive.

DRUM CULTURE

Within a rhythm lies the history of those who created it. Rhythms have been passed down through generations, much like a story, keeping alive the events and the people of the past. Here in the United States the tradition of drumming to honor the harvest, or to welcome the rain, seems distant. However, in many regions of the world, such as Mali, West Africa, rhythms live on strong and continue to be intertwined with the culture. One man, Abdoul Doumbia, has been touring the US for the past eight years teaching the rhythms of his people, the Manding peoples of Mali, to all who wish to learn. Soon the tour will bring him to the Pacific Northwest, and on Nov. 10 he will be teaching a free workshop at The Evergreen State College.

This workshop will be an ideal opportunity for drum-lovers of all skill levels to learn more about the djembe (the type of drum played by Doumbia) as well as about West African music and tradition.

"[The workshop] is a chance to support a different ancestry...it brings new flavors of culture," said Rusty Eklund, local traditional drum teacher.

Doumbia grew up in Mali and at age five was called to drumming. For 16 years he apprenticed Master Jembefola, Moriba Keita, earning his own title of Master. He went on to perform as lead drummer in the 47 part Malian drum company, Babemba, and was chosen eight years in a row to represent his region of Mali in the National Drum Festival of Mali.

"[Doumbia] is probably the finest percussionist of his generation I've come across," said Eklund.

In 1991 Doumbia moved to the United States to teach at Brown University. He later taught at Princeton University before beginning his present

adventure, teaching workshops throughout the United States.

The Nov. 10 workshop at TESC will begin at 3 p.m. in the Longhouse. This workshop was paid for by the TESC Percussion Club, enabling the public to attend free of charge. All other workshops with Doumbia will cost \$20, a small price to pay for the opportunity to learn from such a master. Doumbia will also teach Rusty Eklund's drum class at Traditions in Olympia on Nov. 9 and 16. On both dates he will offer a beginning class at 6:30 p.m. and an intermediate class at 8 p.m. On Nov. 11 he will teach one workshop in the Fairhaven Auditorium at Bellingham at 8 p.m., and on Nov. 12 and 13 he will teach at John's Music in Seattle. Beginning workshops in Seattle will be at 6 p.m. on the 12th and at 3 p.m. on the 13th; intermediate workshops will be at 7:30 p.m. on the 12th and at 4:30 p.m. on the 13th.

Those who wish to attend on or more of Doumbia's workshops are encouraged to bring their own djembes, but extra drums will be available for those without. For more information contact Rusty Eklund at 402-DRUM.

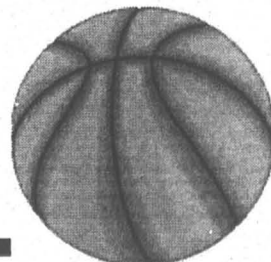

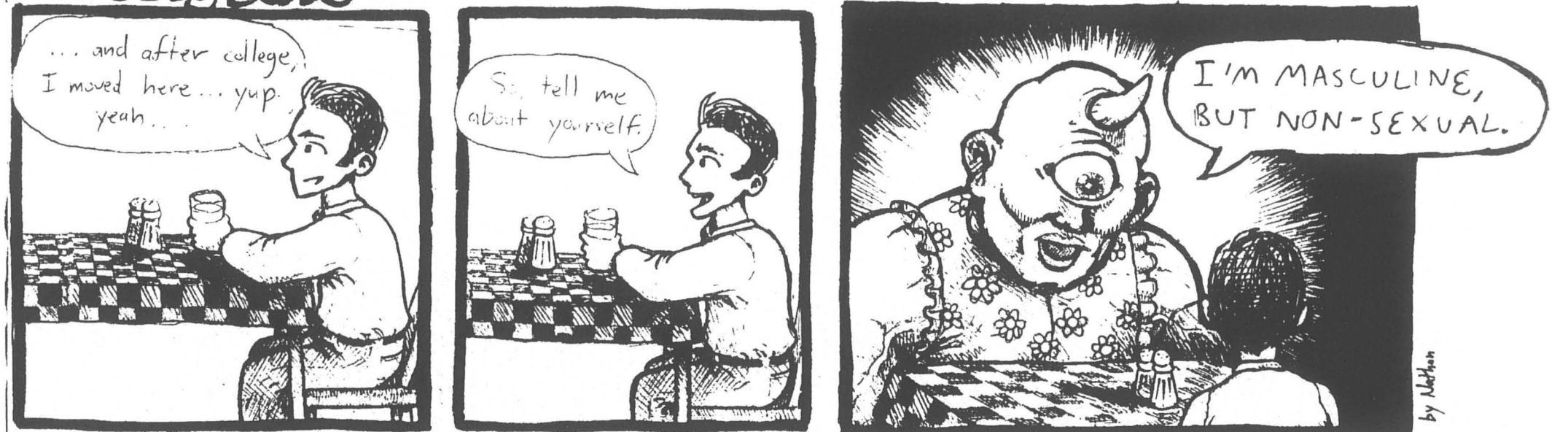
