Two national marine editors will headline a two-day conference on Wooden Boats and the New Craftsman which is expected to draw boat builders from throughout the Pacific Northwest to The Evergreen State College April 28 and 29.

The free, two-day conference, which begins at 9:30 a.m. April 28 in Evergreen's Lecture Hall One, also features a boat show on the central campus plaza, a complete display of appropriate tools, and Olympia boat builder Carl Brownstein demonstrating the art of wood boat construction on a dory.

Sponsored by students in Evergreen's Marine Studies and Crafts program, the conference opens with a keynote address by John Gardner, technical editor of the National Fisherman, who'll discuss "The State of the Art of Wooden Boat Building." Joe Trumbly, teacher and master boat builder at Bates Vocational Technical Institute in Tacoma, will follow Gardner with a slide presentation on wooden boats built and under construction in the United States and Europe.

Six afternoon workshops will highlight the afternoon sessions on April 28. Boat builders and students will examine wood boat building in Puget Sound; lofting; preservation and restoration of wooden boats; tools, fittings, and their availability; wood boat maintenance; and the difficulties of finding appropriate woods.

Tom Kincaid, editor of the Seattle magazine Nor'Westing, will moderate a 3:30 p.m. panel discussion on Wooden Boat Building Today, concluding the Thursday program.

Jonathan Wilson, editor of a national marine magazine called Woodenboat, will launch activities April 29 at 9:30 a.m. with his look at "Possibilities for the Future."

Five workshops will follow his address and offer information on cold molding and

epoxy saturation; toolmaking; caulking; economics and production of wood boats; and environmental considerations of materials and processes used in wooden boat building.

Brownstein, an Olympia boat builder who graduated from Evergreen's first Marine Studies program, will join Tacoma boatbuilder Paul Schweiss and Port Townsend craftsman Sam Conner in examining prospects for "Making a Living at What You Like Doing," at 2:30 p.m. April 29, followed by a panel discussion on the Future of Wooden Boat Building.

The two-day conference concludes with a 6 p.m. fish dinner prepared by Evergreen students and served at the Thurston County Fairgrounds. All events except the dinner are free and open to the public, but students say they will happily accept donations to help with conference expenses.

Planning for a two-day conference on "Wooden Boats and the New Craftsman" has been launched by students in the <sup>Evergreen's</sup> ~~the~~ Marine Studies and Crafts program at ~~The Evergreen State~~ College.

Engaged in building a 38-foot wooden sailing/fishing boat of their own, the students have set a two-day meeting April 28 and 29 to examine the trade -- and the future -- of wooden boat building.

"We invite boat builders, materials experts, designers, students and community members to attend this free conference," say student coordinators Martha Hunting of Seattle and Jon Kawaguchi of Mercer Island.

"We want to examine indepth the state of the art of wooden boat building and its relationship to the rest of the boat building industry," they say. "We also want to explore its chances for survival in a society increasingly appreciative of wooden boats and the skill required to construct them."

Keynote speaker for the two-day conference is John Gardner, a builder and restorer of traditional boats and technical editor of National Fisherman. He will examine contemporary wooden boat building in his opening address April 28, beginning at 9:30 a.m. on the Evergreen campus.

His address will be followed by panel discussions, lectures and workshops where participants will share their knowledge and skills and identify common problems and potential solutions.

"We also hope to generate discussions on the whole role of craftsmen in our society," Ms. Hunting says. "We want to explore the relationship of craftsmen to society's need for a more ecological and human technology."
