Three authorities in the field of campus planning will visit Olympia December 12 and 13 to tour the site for The Evergreen State College and review the master land use plan recently presented to the new college's Board of Trustees.

Members of the review team are Hugh A. Stubbins, Jr., architect from Cambridge, Massachusetts; Dan Kiley, landscape architect from Charlotte, Vermont; and Fred Mann, Seattle architect.

Stubbins graduated from the Georgia School of Technology and received his master's degree from the Harvard University School of Design. After receiving many prizes during his academic career, he won early recognition for his design of the Congress Hall in Berlin.

He is the architect for the administration center at Brandeis University,
Waltham, Massachusetts and has won numerous design awards for such buildings as
Lobe Drama Center at Marvard. Stubbins now is responsible for new construction
at Hampshire College, Amherst, Massachusetts, and is designing a satellite college
at Santa Cruz for the University of California.

Kiley, a graduate of the Harvard University Graduate School of Design, is a registered landscape architect in New York, Chio, Pennsylvania, Florida, Michigan, and Colorado and is a registered architect in Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine.

Recipient of many design awards, Kiley's design commissions have included work for the United States Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado; Rocke-feller University, New York City; Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota; Tufts University, Medford, Massachusetts, and the Santa Cruz campus for the University of California.

Mann was educated at the University of Minnesota and received a master's degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has practiced architecture in California and Seattle, and for ten years served as architect for the University of Washington. He now practices as a consultant on problems of campus planning.
