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A six-hour academic fair May 11 launches registration for more than 20 Summer Quarter programs at The Evergreen State College. Registration for the ten-week summer session continues weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. through June 27 in the Registrar's Office.

The 1977 Summer program offers 13 group contracts, usually involving one faculty member and approximately 20 students in each, and six coordinated studies programs, taught by two instructors for up to 40 students. In addition, some 18 faculty members have been assigned to offer individualized instruction in a variety of subject areas ranging from biology to education, history to philosophy, and literature to visual and performing arts.

Summer programs vary in length from three and a half to ten weeks, and most begin June 27. Programs generate from one to four units of Evergreen credit (equivalent to four quarter hours), depending on the length and type of programs students select.

Highlighting the Evergreen summer session are two programs designed specifically for high school students, two theatrical study offerings, two possibilities for study abroad and a Summer Institute of Western Black Culture.

Advanced high school juniors and seniors are invited to enroll in Environmental Decisions: A Case Study of the Timber Industry. The five-week program explores economic and ecological factors which influence environmental decisions and focuses on the multinational timber industry.

Introduction to Evergreen is designed for persons who have not attended college before. It provides a "second chance" to students who are capable of completing college work but didn't fulfill their academic promise in high school.

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JUDY ANNIS, DIRECTOR Information Services Actors may study their art in two summer programs; one conducted in New York City, the other at Evergreen. The New York program, taught by Evergreen Faculty Dancer Bernard Johansen, offers what he calls "a rare opportunity to earn college credit while studying in one of the world's greatest centers of dance and theater." Faculty Member Andre Tsai is instructing the seven-week Summer Repertory Theater, which will produce two plays for eight performances in August. His program welcomes "highly motivated high school students."

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Those longing for a change of scenery may select from a Summer in Mexico, led by Faculty Member Dr. Ronald Woodbury, and Museums and Monuments, an European program conducted by Faculty Member Dr. Gordon Beck, and emphasizing art in France and Italy. Persons interested in travel programs are urged to register early.

The Institute of Western Black Culture, conducted by Evergreen Faculty Members Dr. S. Rudolph Martin, Jr. and Dr. Winifred Ingram, offers students of all ethnic groups a chance to study the academic and artistic achievements of blacks in the West.

Other programs offered this summer include Life Management Skills; Native American Studies; Human Services and Personality; and Living with the Land.

Group contracts include Basic Mathematics and Computer Programming; Wagners "Ring"; Evergreen Environment; Camerawork; The Self and Other in the Short Story; Landscape and Habitat; Television Violence and Its Effect on Children; Natural History of Washington; and Local-State Relations.
