core, what is near and dear to my heart is farming, gardening, yoga, and meditation."

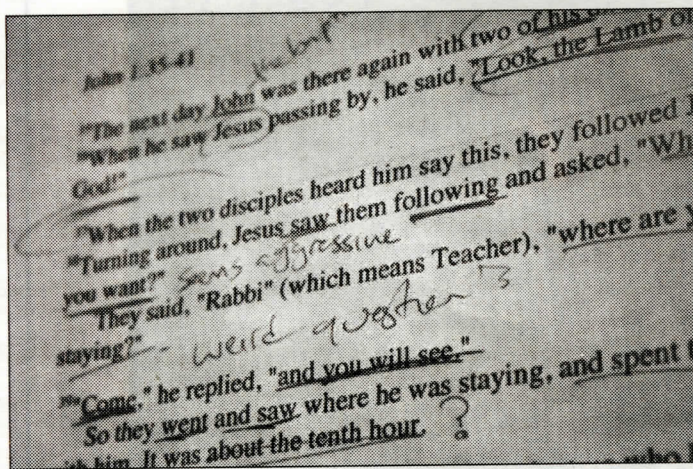

Geoduck women sweep Oregon teams in Greenhouse

Saab drains game winning 3-pointer to keep E-State alive

Friday night (Jan. 22)

The Evergreen women's basketball team hosted Northwest Christian University in perhaps the most crucial must-win game to date for the Lady Geoducks. The top eight teams in the Cascade Collegiate Conference advance to the postseason tournament at the end of February, and Evergreen sat in the "first team out" position in ninth place coming into the game.

In their last meeting against NCU, the Geoducks prevailed by just one point on the road. Donning their home white uniforms, the Geoducks came out punching as Angel Stewart put the first points of the game on the board with a short range jumper from the right wing. The Beacons did not back down, however; they matched the Geoducks almost basket for basket in the first half and trailed by only five points going into halftime.

Early in the second half Evergreen was up by as much as 10 points and it looked like they'd run away with the game. However, having already had 11 games decided by five points or less it was no surprise when the Beacons staged an unbelievable run midway through the second half and took the lead with under eight minutes to go in the game. The run and gun Geoducks were pesky on defense and forced NCU into a shot clock violation, getting the ball back down 51-50. Neither team let up and Geoduck fans relaxed a little when Tana Palmason came to the free-throw line with two shots down by just one point at 54-53. Palmason missed the first of two and the Geoduck faithful all seemed to be holding their breath at the same time.

After Palmason missed the second free throw an almost choreographed exhale was let out and the momentum was now all on Northwest Christian's side. E-State had one more trick up their sleeve, however. The Geoducks came up big when it counted and got a defensive stop and with nine seconds left Alex Saab drained a long distance three to drive the stake into NCU's heart. The roar from the crowd was deafening. Northwest Christian would not be able to convert on their final possession and the Geoducks would again

prevail, this time by two in a 57-55 win.

Latrina Woods played lights out the whole night and left it all on the court. Her 21 points, three rebounds, and three steals set the pace for the Geoducks in the win. Katie Garcin had a huge 13 points and six rebounds. Alex Saab had five points, three assists, and three steals, but no one would disagree that three of her five points may have been the most clutch of the whole season. Coach Monica Heuer was proud that her team "came out very disciplined." As for the game plan, Heuer added, "We executed, that's what we've been working on all season. Earlier in the year we wouldn't have got a shot up." The shot coach Heuer was referring to was Saab's game winning three.

Palmason, Woods lead Geoducks past Warriors

Saturday night (Jan. 23)

One night after one of the most exciting finishes of the Evergreen women's basketball team's season, they took on a dangerous Corban College team that is fighting to stay alive in the conference standings. There would not be as much drama in this one, however, as the Geoducks (9-14 overall, 4-7 CCC) rolled past Corban (8-15 overall, 3-8 CCC) 72-63 in a game with huge postseason implications.

Tana Palmason was the unlikely leading scorer for the Geoducks, posting 18 points while adding 3 rebounds and 3 steals. Latrina Woods had a balanced line of 15 points, eight rebounds, five assists, and two steals. Senior Katie Garcin added 11 points, six rebounds, three assists, two steals, and a block.

The Geoducks improved their conference ranking from ninth place to a tie for seventh with Southern Oregon University, a team the Geoducks have beaten already this season.

This weekend

The Geoducks host Northwest University of Kirkland - not to be confused with Northwest Christian University of Eugene - Friday night at 5:30 at the CRC gym. Admission is free for students with their I.D.

Latrina Woods named CCC Player of the Week

Leading the conference in several categories, Woods has emerged as one of the CCC's best players

Latrina Woods may have had one of her best weekends as an Evergreen basketball player. It got better Tuesday, when she was named Cascade Collegiate Conference Player of the Week for the first time of her Evergreen career. In fact, it's the first time a Geoduck women's basketball player has received the honor this season. This comes just one week after Geoduck men's standout Nate Menefee received the same honor.

Woods shone the brightest when the Geoducks needed her the most. Coming into two must-win games over the weekend, the junior from Skyway, Wash., combined for 36 points, 11 rebounds, six assists, and five steals. Evergreen State coach Monica Heuer has praised Woods week in and week out for her gutsy play and ability to penetrate opposing defenses. The Geoduck guard ranks in the top ten in the CCC in four different categories including fourth in steals with 61 (2.77/gm) and sixth in scoring with 305 points on the season (13.9/gm). If the Geoducks plan to make a run into the post season, it would most definitely have to be on the back of Latrina Woods, the heartbeat of the women's team.

Then, I would write essays designed to undermine the history lectures based on what I had just read in that book. My teacher was pissed.

I was going to go to Zinn's lecture Feb. 6, simply so I could get the chance to shake his hand. If I had the courage, I would tell him that even though I'd never even seen him in person, he is one of the handful of people who have changed my life.

I can't do that anymore. Instead, I can take solace, and a sense of honor, that I existed while he had existed and am one of millions who were touched and changed by his work.

Geoduck men extend win streak, gain national ranking

Menefee and Feliciano pace the Geoducks in conference showdown

Friday night (Jan. 22)

Men's basketball looked to extend their two-game winning streak as they hosted the Northwest Christian University Beacons in the Greenhouse last Friday. The Geoducks played an up and down game but outpaced the Beacons 84-71 for their eighth win of the season.

The Beacons and Geoducks traded 3-pointers in their first possession of the game, proving that these two teams would not be afraid to shoot the ball in this contest. Evergreen had trouble getting into a rhythm early but was still able to outplay NCU into the halftime break with a 40-30 advantage.

Nate Menefee and Ben Wilson turned up the heat in the second half, and Evergreen began to pull away from the Beacons. Guarding a 17-point lead, the Geoducks began to get careless with the ball and let the visiting team get back into the game. NCU began their charge with a 7-0 run to bring the game within 10 with eight minutes to go in the game. The expression on Coach Jeff Drinkwine's face was worth a thousand words, and you could almost hear his teeth gritting watching from the stands. The Geoducks regained control of the game, however, and closed the game out the way they've grown accustomed to.

Coach Drinkwine said after the game that he was pleased with the way the defense played. "I think our defense stepped up, we held them to 30," and added he thinks the team can be very dangerous "if [we] keep the intensity up. I think we let off the gas pedal a little at the end of the game."

Nate Menefee did not falter at all one week after being voted NAIA and CCC Player of the week, pacing the Geoducks with 22 points, four rebounds, three assists, and three steals. Menefee had a lot of help from 6-foot-8 senior Anthony Gallagher, who scored 19 points and had five rebounds. Julio Feliciano again contributed heartily to the Geoducks' effort nearing triple-double stats with his nine points, 11 rebounds, and eight assists.

Troyer's 26 enough to get Evergreen past Corban

Saturday night (Jan. 23)

The Geoducks (16-5 overall, 9-2 CCC) rolled in their 93-84 win over the last place Corban College Warriors (6-16 overall, 1-10 CCC). Evergreen crept within one game of 10 conference wins for the season with the victory and put themselves in a two-way tie atop the CCC standings. Perhaps more satisfying than anything for the Geoduck faithful is that they are now ranked No. 20 in the country for NAIA Division-II competition.

Nate Menefee had a lightning bolt start to the game, scoring 20 of his 22 points in the first half. Menefee also had four rebounds and three assists. Josh Troyer, who has been a

pivotal piece of the E-State basketball puzzle, led all scorers with 26 points in the high-scoring affair. It was Troyer's second highest scoring total of the season, just one point shy of his season high 27 against Multnomah Bible College. Troyer went 9-12 shooting and 3-4 from the free-throw line. Sophomore Tyrell Dixon has been an up and coming player on the Evergreen basketball team running the point; his 12 points and three assists are a harbinger of his future as a Geoduck. As a team the Geoducks shot 12-24 (.500) from 3-point land and 11-16 (.688) from the free-throw line.

This weekend

The Geoducks take on Northwest University of Kirkland this Friday at 7:30 p.m. in the Greenhouse and look to improve upon their four-game win streak. Admission is free to students with school I.D.

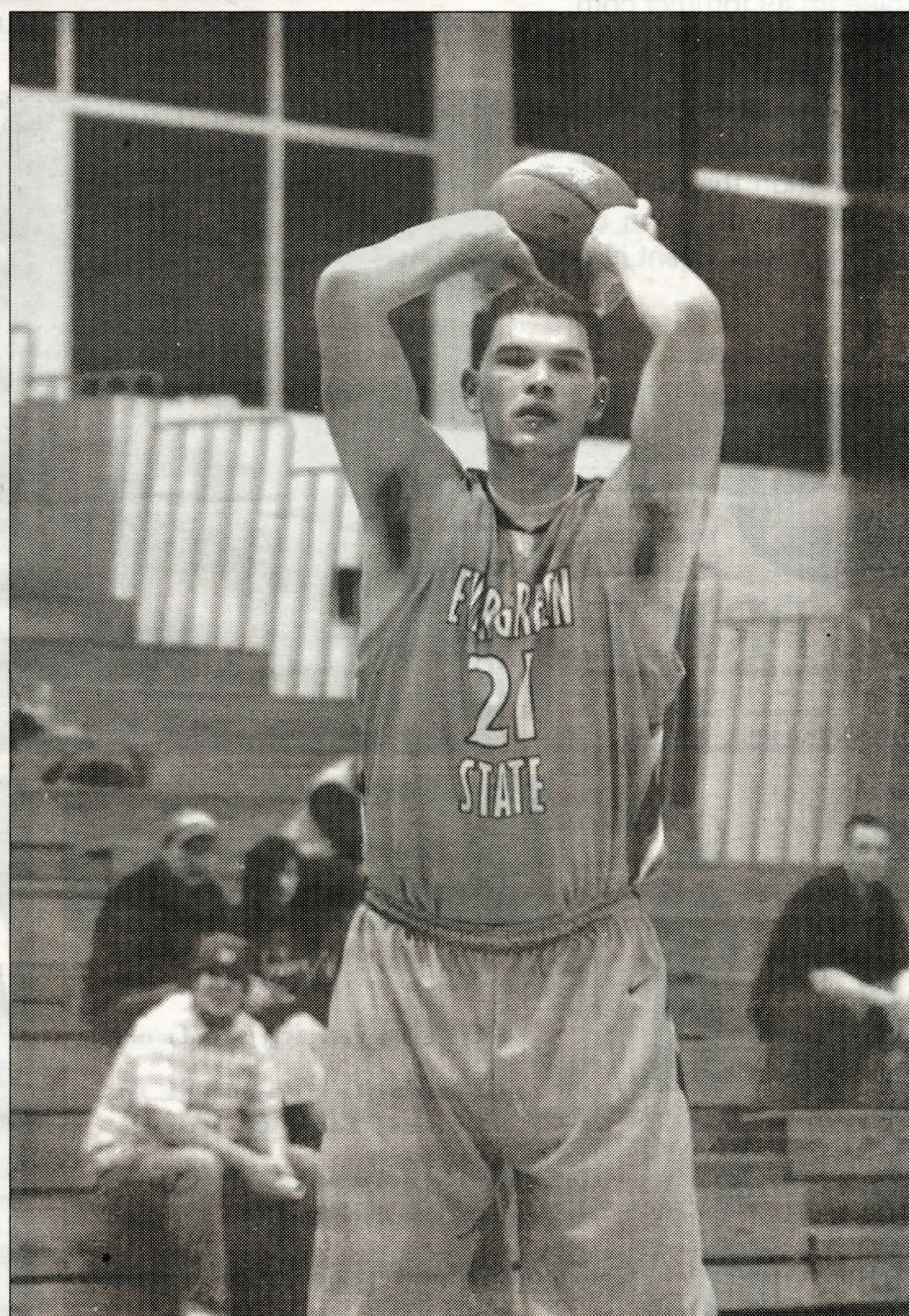
